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REICH FURTHER VIOLATES VERSAILLES PACT

MADRID SHELLED AND BOMBED BY INSURGENTS

Germany Resumes Traffic Control On Her Waterways

Denounces Navigation Clause I Great War Treaty. France Fears Campaign Against Russia.

BERLIN, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Germany has shaken off another of her Versailles Treaty shackles today by resuming control of traffic on her rivers and renouncing international governing commissions set up by the treaty.

Signatories of the Versailles Pact were advised that Germany considers the internationalization clause to assure foreign traffic equal rights with German shipping is no longer valid. Henceforth river traffic and the strategic Kiel Canal will be subject to German regulation, it was announced.

A Foreign Office spokesman said the step was a "mere shaking off of Versailles control" but that traffic would not be affected, although renunciation of the internationalization clause put Germany in a position to restrict foreign traffic on the upper Rhine if it should be fortified or on any other river in the event of emergency.

Is Latest Breach

The newest break from Great War treaty restrictions followed by eight months' remilitarization of the Rhineland, also in violation of the Versailles Pact and a step that roused France to vigorous protest. Specifically affected by Saturday's nullification of part of the Versailles Pact were the Upper Rhine and Moselle, the Upper Danube, the Elbe and the Oder Rivers. Traffic on these rivers has been administered by commissions representing interested nations and with German representation—the minority.

The Czechoslovakian free port at Hamburg, a 99-year grant under the treaty, will not be affected, authoritative sources said.

The strategically vital Kiel Canal also will be under German administration henceforth. Germany no longer will recognize article 369 of the treaty whereby the canal must be maintained open to both merchant and war vessels of foreign nations.

Equality Of Rights

The Government will be guided by the principle that vessels of foreign countries at peace with Germany may enjoy the same rights on inland waterways as now are permitted German vessels on the waterways of the respective foreign countries, a communique stated.

The announcement pointed out that Germany tried by negotiations to reach an international agreement replacing the Versailles waterways regime but "other participating powers could not make up their minds to relinquish a system which in fundamental principles cannot be reconciled to German sovereign rights."

British Reaction

LONDON, Nov. 15.—(CP-Havas)—A statement in the House of Commons tomorrow may be the only official reaction of the British.

LIBERTY TO BE HELD BY R. C. M. POLICE

Mounted Police headquarters in Charlottetown received instructions from Ottawa headquarters Saturday ordering the detention of the motor vessel Liberty, Inspector Frisps said last night. Orders for the disposal of the vessel had not been received by the Police.

The speedy 59-foot craft was seized off the Magdalen Islands, on November 6 following a three-day search of Gulf waters and brought to Charlottetown by the police boat Alachasse. The Liberty had been hailed off North Point, Prince Edward Island early on November 4 and ordered to stop by the police boat but sped away and escaped due to superior speed.

The captain and crew of the vessel had been released by the R. C. M. P. last week on a charge of failing to stop when called on but the vessel had been held awaiting instructions from Ottawa. No charges would be laid against captain or crew police said last night.

The Liberty was registered at St. Pierre and was in command of Captain Henry Ducos of St. Pierre. The vessel carried a crew of four besides the skipper.

Seven Feared Lost In Lake Shipping Tragedies

The wind howled a chant of death over the Great Lake; today. While Lake Huron was scanned in vain for trace of the Canadian tug Frederick A. Lee, which apparently went down with five hands, fire swept the motor yacht Don Juan on Lake Erie Sunday and two men were believed burned to death. Also on Lake Erie, 30 miles east of Cleveland, high, snow-laden winds tossed the coal freighter Sidney E. Smith aground. The crew of 30 aboard was believed not in danger.

DENY LAW COURTS WILL BE ABOLISHED

Official Denial of Alleged Planned Action By Mussolini Published.

ROME, Nov. 15.—Official denial was made tonight that Premier Mussolini intends to abolish law courts and substitute corporative committees. It was said officially the law courts will not be changed. Displeasure was expressed in official circles that lawyers in the United States should have interpreted the reported possibility of such a change as indicating freedom of trial was being impaired in Italy.

(The Rome correspondent of The Associated Press said his dispatch of Friday relating to the Italian courts was based on information from excellent legal sources whom he had no reason to doubt.

(The original dispatch reported reliable sources as having said Mussolini was expected to abolish all law courts and substitute special boards or committees from various divisions of the corporative state.)

The Stefan news agency published the following press bureau communique:

"The Rome correspondent of the Associated Press has sent to his newspaper piles of news absolutely false and ridiculous in affirming that abolition of civil and penal tribunals in Italy is coming soon and that they will be substituted with nobody knows what kind of corporative commissions. "Absolutely nothing of this (kind) is being studied and there are no contemplated provisions of this kind. The correspondent of the American agency has therefore fully invented this news and has committed a highly deplorable act."

NORTH SYDNEY, N. S., Nov. 15.—Four North Sydney men, injured when their automobile toppled over a 15-foot bank near St. Peter's, were being returned from the Maritime Winter Fair at Amherst, where recovering tonight. The accident occurred late Friday.

TORONTO, Nov. 15.—Nine former Mayors of Toronto will be honorary pallbearers tomorrow at the civic funeral of Sam McBride, 70, first chief magistrate of this city ever to die in harness. The late Mayor's body will lie in state at City Hall for several hours prior to the funeral service in the main corridor. Burial will be at Mount Pleasant Cemetery in the afternoon.

Ethiopians Still Resist Invasion

ADDIS ABABA, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Italian columns are on the move again in Ethiopia. Six months after troops occupied this capital city and Premier Mussolini proclaimed the annexation of Ethiopia, the war still is in progress against unconquered chieftains. Ethiopian irregular—the Italians call them bandits—are fighting bitterly to prevent the invaders from extending their dominion. The territory which the Italians have not yet occupied represents approximately one-fourth of all Ethiopia.

\$20,000 Fire At Hampton, N. B.

HAMPTON, N. B., Nov. 15.—(CP)—Checked by two volunteer fire departments and residents, an outbreak of unknown origin was confined to a portion of the business block at Hampton Station this afternoon. Loss was estimated at more than \$20,000.

CANADA ON UPGRADE SINCE 1932

Dominion's Progress Out of World Depression Exceeds That of U. S.

CLEVELAND, Nov. 15.—(CP)—American business men were advised today by Colonel L. P. Ayres, business statistician and Vice-President of the Cleveland Trust Company, to compare United States recovery with that of Canada. In the four years since 1932, he said in the bank's business bulletin, "Canada has regained 97 per cent of the depression losses while this country has regained 70 per cent of them."

Col. Ayres concluded: "We should be asking ourselves how it is that Canadian business has been able to accomplish an almost complete recovery, and to do it in the main by old-fashioned, unadorned methods of self-reliance and local initiative."
