SIDE LIGHT ON COBBLING.—"Rambler" in the Atlantic Leader, Halifax, writes: A retired shoemaker told the "Rambler" an interesting story the other night. He said he had a pair of shoes that needed repairing, and as he had his bench kit, he decided to do the job himself. He bought the material retail, soles, heel-lifts, and nails and they cost him 45c. It took him one hour and a half to do the job at 50 cents an hour 75 cents total cost \$1.20. He said had a regular cobbler done the job it would have cost him \$2.00 a saving by doing it himself of 80 cents. Since the regular cobblers buy wholesale, he figured that their profit on soles and heel-lifts is 90 cents a pair. Say at that rate shoe doctoring is not to be despised from the dollar and cents standpoint.

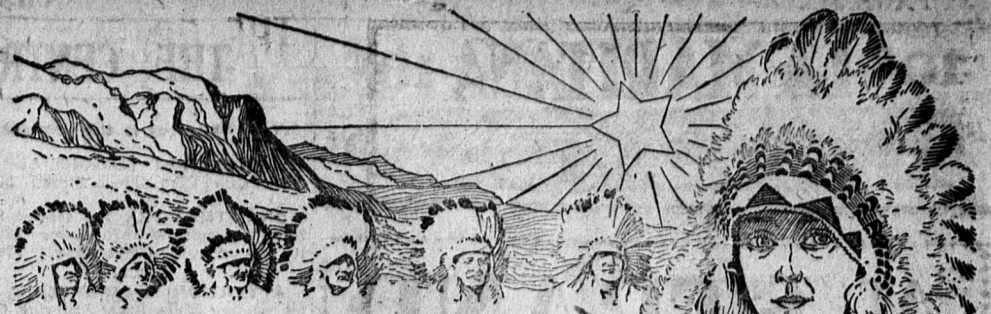
