POLITICAL CRISIS IN ENGLAND

Mr. Lloyd George Has Resigned as Secretary for War. Premier Asquith Advises King to Consent to Reconstruction of Cabinet.

(Special to the Guardian) LONDON, Dec. 3.—The political crisis has become acute. It is stated in well informed circles that David Lloyd George, War Secretary, has tendered his resignation which has not been accepted.

THE WAR SITUATION ON THE BALKAN FRONT

Russians Advancing Along 200 Mile Front Threatening Left Wing of Teutonic Army. In Dobrudja Region They Have Gained Possession of one of Danube Bridges.

(Canadian Press Despatches) LONDON, Dec. 3.—The Daily Telegraph says: "Just at the moment when the situation in Roumania looked almost desperate, her nearest ally suddenly intervened with a comprehensive movement, which certainly will act as a drag, if nothing more, on the operations of Falkenhayn and Mackensen."

THE UNITED STATES MAY "TAKE NOTICE"

U. S. Government Informs Germany of Its Concern Over Deportation of Belgians and Cannot Avoid "Taking Notice."

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Acting on its own behalf, the American government has informed Germany anew of its deep concern over the deportation of Belgians from their own country by German military authorities. This action has been taken as a result of information about the deportation gathered from different sources, and after fruitless informal efforts on behalf of the Belgians made by American Charge Grew at Berlin.

BRITISH STEAMER AT NEWPORT NEWS WITH WOUNDED MEN

(Canadian Press Despatch) NEWPORT NEWS, Va., Dec. 1.—The British steamer Rotomah, London to Auckland, arrived here today to take on fuel coal. Among her 250 passengers were 102 wounded officers and men of the New Zealand regiments returning to their homes on sick leave. The men came ashore to go sight seeing.

HEAVY GUN-FIRE BETWEEN ARTILLERY ACTIVE NORTH OF YPRES

(Canadian Press Despatch) LONDON, Dec. 2.—During the night heavy artillery was active north of Ypres, and near Guedecourt, says the official report today from the Franco-Belgian front.

NEWFOUNDLAND'S PART IN THE WAR

(Canadian Press Despatch) ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Dec. 2.—The extent to which the Newfoundland regiment suffered on the opening day of the British drive in July last became known today, when the figures of its losses were made public.

FRENCH AVIATORS IN BOMBING RAID Drop Explosives on Railroad Station at Spincourt.

(Canadian Press Despatch) PARIS, Dec. 2.—An official statement says: "Last night passed quietly along the entire front. During the night of December 1-2, one of our aviators threw down nine bombs of 120 millimetres upon the railroad station at Spincourt and three others of the same size upon barracks of the enemy at Billy-Sur-Mangiennes."

SUBMARINES REPORTED ON ATLANTIC COAST

BOSTON, Dec. 3.—All through the night radio messages flashed at four hour intervals, warning shipping against the possible presence of two German fighting submarines, believed to have slipped through the British patrol fleet and to be on their way here.

CANADIAN TROOPS ARRIVED SAFELY

OTTAWA, December 3.—It is officially announced through the Chief Press Censor's Office, that the under-mentioned troops have arrived safely in England:— 171st Quebec Battalion, partly French-Canadian; 202nd Alberta Battalion, Montreal, drafts, artillery, infantry, army service corps and army medical corps.

SHIPWRECKED CREW LANDED AT HALIFAX

HALIFAX, December 1.—The North Cambria, Captain T. Evans, twenty two days from Barry Dock, arrived here yesterday. She landed here Captain Oscar Joston and crew of the American tern schooner William P. Hood, whom she took off their unmanageable vessel about 250 miles to the westward of Fastnet Light, on the Irish Coast.

LOW LIGHTS ON VESSELS SUPREME COURT IN SUMMERSIDE

OTTAWA, December 3.—The Naval Department has issued a "low lights" order, applying to all vessels within Canadian waters on the Atlantic coast, and extending up the St. Lawrence River as far as the port of Quebec. No vessel may carry electric anchor, bow or steaming lights.

SIXTY KILLED AND 150 INJURED

LONDON, December 1.—Sixty-six persons, a majority of them soldiers, have been killed in a railway accident at Herckeehafen. The injured aggregated 150, sixty of them being hurt seriously.
