not got, and for a bungalow which has not been built." Defendant said "Yes," but he would make arrangements for the bungalow to be built. He made a rambling and unintelligible explanation as to the absence of this deed.

Sir George then said: "Where is Captain Quinn's £432 at this moment?" Defendant replied: "I have paid it to my banking account with the Royal Bank of Canada." Defendant said he had spent some of the money in expenses—not in connection with the property.

Witness said: "Really, Mr. Mitchell, the proper thing for you to do would be to return this £432, and your clients keep the land." Defendant's solicitor said he would consider the suggestion, and the interview then terminated.

Cross examined: When I got defendant's admission that this money had been paid into his banking account at the Royal Bank of Canada, I caused papers to be laid before Counsel to advise whether there was any way whereby this money or a part of it could be secured. Upon Counsel's advice an application was made in the King's Bench Division, and an order was made. When produced at the bank the manager said there was only a small sum there—about £24. That would be about December 12.

The order was made nisi, and the defendant had an opportunity of being heard. Those proceedings have been stayed. Their only object was to try and rescue some of this money. Under a misapprehension a summons for direction had been taken out.

Witness's object was to ascertain whether defendant's dealings with the prosecutor were honest. Witness understood defendant had represented Prince Edward Island for emigration purposes. He had no recollection of defendant saying anything about the fox farming scheme at his interview with him. He was informed that land for the scheme was being provided by private individuals, including the Hon. John Sinclair. Defendant said the title deeds were not available. Witness did not remember being told the deeds would be provided by the owners of the land in Prince Edward Island.

He understood from the receipt that the land was the property of the Government of Prince Edward Island. Witness said: "You have had the money for three months; has a bungalow been built?" After covering several of the objects with a preventive dust settling, the top of the sarcophagus was covered with thin boards, supports were placed under the lid and new locks were attached to the doors, which were again closed.

Carter Not Present.

The party then went to the tomb of Set II, which is being utilized as a laboratory for the storage of the objects taken from the tomb. Here also the locks were removed and pieces of the shrine which were more or less exposed to the weather, were wrapped in protective covers.

Neither Mr. Carter nor any member of his staff were present. It is understood that he placed the matter in the hands of the courts to determine his rights, until which time nothing inside the tomb can be removed.

The tomb will be closed after the public view, which it is expected the Government will permit during the next ten days, when about 2,000 persons will be admitted. In the event of the failure of the Government to adjust its differences with Carter it considers the antiquities department capable of completing the work.

It owes the bank \$120,000. The total liabilities were \$130,000. The account was guaranteed by Mr. Daly to the extent of \$45,000. The guarantee he regarded as having no value.

When Mr. Lee commenced questioning the witness as to the assets of the Canadian Property Company, which concern controlled the bank's real estate, the losses upon which had been placed at \$150,000, Mr. Clarkson declared that the losses would be nearer \$285,000, but he was going to exercise the privilege allowed him by the master and would refuse to go into particulars.

The loss on the account of the Canadian Shoe Company, Limited, and the King Shoe Company had been placed at \$475,000. It would probably be \$25,000 more.

The estate of General Mason, former president and general manager of the Home Bank, was represented in the list of losses by a three year old note of \$54,517 guaranteed by H. J. Daley. In the estimate Mr. Clarkson had put at \$14,000 the possible amount realizable on this account, but it was very doubtful whether anything at all would be realized.

General Mason, Mr. Clarkson said, had carried a fluctuating overdraft. "There is a story there," said the witness, when Mr. Lee asked as to the account of the False Creek Timber Company in British Columbia, in which a loss of \$12,000 was estimated on a loan of \$126,394. This company began in 1917 as the Reynolds Timber Company, organized for the purpose of cutting on the Frost Limits held by the bank.
