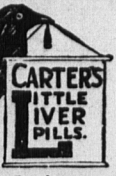

In regard to the indefinite charge, incapable of proof, of extravagance on the part of the Government, the Premier pointed out that in the House of Assembly at the last session of the Legislature, Mr. Richards, the late Liberal Leader, made the same charge during the consideration of the estimates and after they had been nearly gone through. He was challenged by the Premier, who had the estimates re-considered item by item for Mr. Richards' benefit, to point out a single item of extravagance and suggest wherein economy might be practised, and admitted in each case that he could not. All he could say was that "some people say you are extravagant." Mr. Richards could personally see nothing extravagant in the estimates, and he was a far more capable man than any of those in his party to do so. In conclusion, the Premier pointed out that whereas in the present Government came into power there was not a province in all Canada whose financial standing was more desperate than Prince Edward Island, at the close of 1914, his was the only Province in the Dominion which came out with a surplus. (Applause.) The Premier resumed his seat amidst great applause.

Mr. Chandler followed in an anecdotal speech which was received with a murmur. He lauded the Liberal Leader to the skies and falling to earth sympathy in this regard he declared the "Mathieson Government doomed." (Vigorous applause by Messrs. Chandler and Cuminsky.) "It is up to the people," he added, "to elect a man who will give the Government to power." (Upbraiding laughter. A voice: much!) He said: "MR. MATHIESON IS AN ABLE MAN AND WE ADMIRE HIS ABILITY; AND WE GIVE HIM CREDIT FOR THE \$100,000 SUBSIDY." But, of course, he must attack Mr. Mathieson personally in regard to his salary, at the same time criticising other salaries. (A voice: What salary are you after? Laughter.) In regard to the oats question Mr. Chandler made a statement that "two reputable men" in Charlottetown had told him the oats were badly damaged. Tackled by the Premier, who (supported by a large percentage of the audience) asked for the names of the two men—who, if they were reputable, as Mr. Chandler claimed, would not be afraid to come out in the open and make a manly attack—Mr. Chandler squirmed and said he would not give the names. The audience laughed at him. The Premier insisted but Mr. Chandler "squealed," in spite of the demand of the audience. (A voice: No two men at all.) In regard to automobiles he again made a charge on the authority of persons of his imagination. Three Liberal automobile owners, he said, were working in Charlottetown to defeat him and his colleague. THE PREMIER: Who are the three?

MR. CHANDLER: I can't tell you. (Voices: Yes, give us the names.) THE PREMIER: Give us the names. You are giving either too
