Montreal Markets Outstanding Production

Following are quotations from the Montreal Trade Bulletin, May 9th:

EGG MARKET

A feature of the egg trade as present is the heavy movement of supplies into cold storage for future requirements and, according to latest advices country shippers are now paying 23c per dozen for extras, 20c for firsts, and 16c for seconds. The local market has been unchanged all week, prices being about steady with a fair volume of business passing in a wholesale jobbing way in fresh specials at 32c to 33c, extras at 29c to 30c, firsts at 26c to 27, and seconds at 23c to 24c per dozen.

Calgary—Receipts heavy with good demand; prices down 1c. Extras, 17c; No. 1, 16c; No. 2, 12c; cracks, 9c.

Toronto—Fresh extras, 23c to 24c; do, firsts, 21c to 22c; do, seconds, 18c; do, splits, 18c.

BUTTER MARKET

The market has been easy all week with prices slightly shaded owing to the somewhat liberal supplies and the absence of any outside demand. Sales are largely confined to small lots to meet actual wants and were made of No. 1 pasteurized creamery at 29 1/2c per lb; No. 2 creamery at 28c per lb. A steady trade was reported in a wholesale jobbing way and prices were unchanged at 30c to 31c per lb for finest creamery in solid packages and at 31c to 32c per lb in 1 1/2 blocks.

Calgary—Prices unchanged but uncertain. Receipts and quality good. Dairy Butter—Fancy 26c. Creamery Butter—No. 1, cartons, lb, 36c; No. 2, cartons, lb, 31-32c; No. 1, prints, lb, 35c; No. 2, prints, 30-31c.

Toronto—Creamery, specials solids, 27 1/2-28c; do No. 1, 27-27 1/2c; do No. 2, 25-25c.

POTATO MARKET

On Friday last the market was stronger and there was an advance of 10c per bag under a continued steady demand. Supplies are by no means heavy, consequently a firm feeling has prevailed all week with sales of Green Mountains at \$1.50 to \$1.55 per bag, and Quebec cream \$1.40 to \$1.45 per bag of 90 lbs in bulk extract.

Calgary—Local trade supplied at from \$17 to \$20 per ton. Cars moving from all parts of province.

Toronto—Potatoes, bag, in small lots, Ontario, to retail trade, \$1.75; do on track, per bag, in carlots, \$1.50-\$1.55; do N.B. Delawares, to retail trade, \$1.90-\$2.00.

HAY MARKET

A moderate amount of business continues to be done in baled hay with the United States, but the trade for domestic account continues quiet for the time of year. A steady feeling prevailed with a moderate amount of business passing and sales of car lots of No. 2 Timothy were made at \$18 per ton and No. 3 Timothy at \$14 to \$15 per ton, f.o.b. cars here.

Calgary market very dull; only movement is small quantity of Timothy. Prices nominal. Timothy, country points, \$10 to \$11; Upland, country points, \$8 to \$9; Alfalfa, country points, \$10 to \$11; Upland, Calgary market, \$12. Toronto—Hay—Baled, on track, Toronto, per ton, good, No. 2, \$14.50; loose hay, No. 1, \$18 and No. 2, \$14 to \$16.

Straw—Per ton, in carlots, track, Toronto, per ton, \$9.50.

BRITISH BACON MARKET

Canadian boxed bacon 67s to 72s Dales 74s to 80s, steady. American 58s to 64s, Irish 94s to 104s, steady. Danish 88s to 92s, good demand, head, with lighter American ship Danish Killings estimated 71.50 per ton, the outlook is reported as more promising.

The production of the pure bred Holstein cow Mary Tengin Rooker, No. 61499, owned by Messrs Melligan and Morrison, Northern places her in the top notch class among the cows that have produced our one hundred pounds milk in twenty four hours. Mary freshened on March 14th 1924 and was milked twice daily until April 1st, producing as high as eighty pounds a day. On April 1st she was started on a eight hour schedule and her production ran up to ninety one and one-half pounds.

On April 15th she was again changed to a six hour plan and has milked as high as one hundred and three pounds in twenty four hours and has averaged over one hundred pounds per day for seven days. During the month of April she produced 2766.5 pounds, milk being an average daily yield of 92.2 pounds milk, and during the last half of April her daily average was 96.5 pounds.

This cow was started on an official seven day R. O. M. on April 24th, and has put up a record of 66.3 pounds milk and 26.88 pounds butter. Thus we see that Mary is a good long distance cow, her official test coming at a time when her fat production would be the lowest of any line during her whole period. She also has a 305 day record of 14445 pounds milk and nearly 600 pounds butter.

This cow comes of P. E. Island stock having been bred by Mr. Harry Best, Craipaud, both her sire and dam being also Island bred. Another strong feature about this cow is the fact that she has the faculty of transmitting her good qualities to her offspring, her oldest daughter Mary Echo Dr. Kol has a junior two year old 305 day record of over eleven thousand pounds butter and has just dropped a calf on April 26th, and is now milking over ninety pounds per day testing 3.6% fat, while her daughter, Monday Rooker Pantico has milked almost 9000 pounds milk in five and one half months as a junior two year old, and is still growing from fifty seven to sixty pounds per day. To all appearances this trio will make other Island Holstein breeders step back for them next year, and get into line with some of their breeding.

As we do we feel sure that, wherever you may be called, by duty, you will bring honour to yourself and to the district which will always pride itself on calling you one of its girls.

Although you are going you are not going far, so you are leaving behind a strong hope that we may see you often. And let us assure you that whenever that may be you will have from all a most happy welcome.
