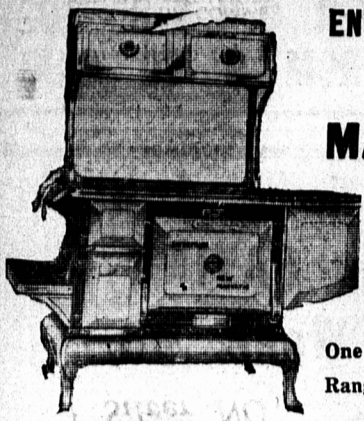

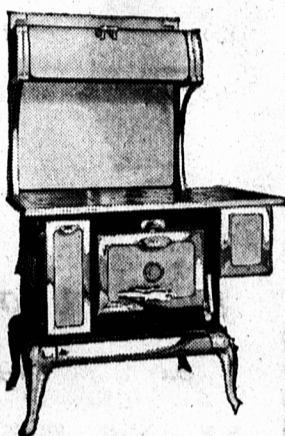

Will Fortell Weather Probs Further Ahead

OTTAWA, July 11—A man of science sits in the Dominion Observatory here making investigations and compiling records that he hopes will some day bring long-range forecasts of weather conditions in Canada. He has been keeping the records for years but they are still incomplete to permit more than vague conclusions. The man, Dr. Ralph E. DeLury, assistant director of the observatory in charge of solar physics, believes vast storms that occur in regular phases across the sun's surface fluencing to a degree at present undetermined accurately, rainfall, average temperature, plant growth and the lives of insects, animals and men.

Sunspots are attended by large bright, high-flying clouds in the sun's atmosphere emitting such quantities of ultra-violet rays that when spots are most plentiful ultra-violet light reaching the earth may be double the amount received when they are scarce. Dr. DeLury's observations have led to guarded conclusions that the effect of sunspots which occur in cycles of about 11 years varies with the nature of the country, while the record is obscured to some extent by occurrence of local phenomena that render precise investigation difficult.

In a paper on Dr. DeLury's work the department of the interior says some effects of sunspots on the weather are indicated as the country varies show temperatures throughout the country are higher when there are few sunspots and lower when many appear. The greatest range between the sunspot minimum and maximum is four degrees, Fahrenheit, the least one degree and the average for the country two degrees. The greatest variation has been observed at Calgary. Observations at the Toronto Bureau of the Meteorological Service of Canada show about 30 per cent. more thunderstorms occur at the sunspot minimum than at the maximum. The observatory draws the conclusion that the forest fire hazard from lightning varies accordingly.

Inland more rain falls at sunspot minima. The prairie provinces record shows about 50 per cent. more rainfalls at the minimum than at the maximum. The reverse happens at coastal points, observations at St. John's, Nfld., shows. Growth rings of trees, numbers of grasshoppers, grouse and rabbits are greater at or near sunspot minima than at the maxima. Near the minima prairie wheat records show an increase in bushels per acre of from 7 to 20 in wheat, oats, barley and rye. This observation covers the cycles between 1908 and 1929. In the same period and in the same way potatoes showed a yield variation of 25 per cent. Dr. DeLury's observation show that the sunspot minimum occurred near the end of 1923 and that the next maximum should come about the middle of 1935. That year the average temperature of the country should be lower, fewer thunderstorms should occur, less rain should fall inland, but more on the coasts. There should be fewer grasshoppers, more rabbits, and trees should grow more slowly and crops be less abundant.

Tweedsmuir Kin Always Was Wise

Robert Stewart Brown, who lives in the bush country, 100 miles north of Winnipeg, is a young Scotsman who is a second cousin of Lord Tweedsmuir, Governor-General designate. They used to meet nearly 30 years ago at Mr. Brown's grandmother's house. In those days, not even the doting grandmother ever dreamed that one day John Buchan would be created a baron and sent to Canada as the representative of His Majesty. "Everybody in Winnipeg called him Johnnie and he used to overawe all of us younger relatives with his city manners and display of learning," said Mr. Brown to a Winnipeg Free Press interviewer. "Even in those days he was wise beyond his years. He moved in an entirely different sphere from the rest of us country cousins and was looked up to because of his fine ways and superior education. Johnnie always was a good steady lad and being a baron would spoil him in the least. He was always a democratic type of man, and after all, a handle doesn't mean much in Canada. He'll get on all right out here," predicted Mr. Brown.

Although only a recent arrival to the Bayton district, Mr. Brown is well known through the district. Apparently no one but his wife ever calls him anything else but "Sooty" for the governor-general's younger relative is as typical a Scot as ever joined with two of his countrymen in strange country to form a St. Andrew's society.

Unemployed May Work For Summer

TORONTO, July 11—Unemployed will be allowed to do farm work in the summer and return to relief rolls in the Fall without being questioned as to their earnings, it was announced today as a delegation from the Ontario Mayors' Association presented findings of its conference to Premier Mitchell Hepburn and Hon. David A. Croll, Minister of Welfare. Premier Hepburn was "very much interested" in a resolution asking action be taken to arrange for loans to municipalities at interest

Protecting Britain From Air Raids

LONDON, July 11—A comprehensive program for protecting Britain's population against air raids went out today to all local authorities in England, Scotland and Wales, accompanied by assurances that "the need for these measures in no way implies risk of war."
The government's circular, which made plain that local authorities would be responsible in the final analysis for protection of the public, also pledged the government to continue striving for peace.
The government already has made arrangements for an initial supply of respirators to be allotted partly for training in their use against gas and partly to build up reserves. It was announced the work would be begun along these lines:
1. Accumulation of reserve stocks of respirators and protective clothing for the use of those engaged in precautionary measures.
2. Building up of reserves of "bleach powder" for decontamination work.
3. Probable establishment of an anti-gas school for civilians.
4. Use of the Red Cross and the Order of St. John Ambulance Corps to assist in the enrollment and training of an anti-gas medical emergency corps.
Air raids warnings, lighting restrictions, rescue and salvage work were left entirely up to local authorities.
