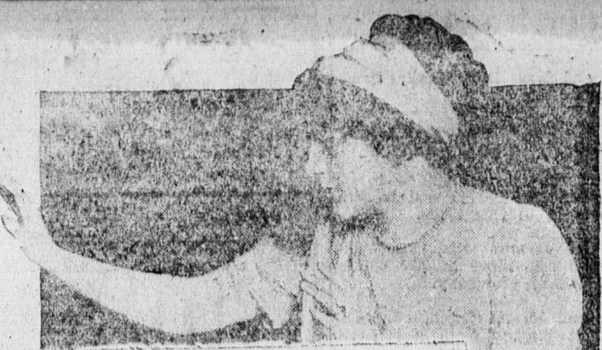
M. R. Bethune, city, leaves this morning for Toronto where he will attend the Annual Convention of the Canadian Order of Foresters as a delegate from the Court in this city. The Convention opens today and will be attended by about 600 delegates. It is unlikely that any business of a contentious nature will be introduced at the High Court meeting and there is no proposal to increase the rates. Chief Ranger Stewart will probably be opposed by a Toronto man.

The Guardian is informed by two agents who were at Major C. McKinnon's, Gilmartine, that his men were just finishing a field of white oats that took over 20 days with two able teams of horses to harrow and sow the field. It consists of 105 acres and in one field, 75 acres was sown and a part, now laid, was under pasture for two years. This needed a good deal of work to make satisfactory for seeding. 30 acres are stubble which a crop of oats had grown on last season. This is counted the largest field of grain which has been seen or known of in this province for some time. They also saw a tan and green of wheat which for quality they have seen nothing to equal this season.

This afternoon H. H. Crossman, City, will launch his motor house boat, the "Painter," so well known throughout the province. She will be looked up on a motor truck, and will be hauled to the water front by the steam roller and will go off the wharf dock. The boat has been rebuilt and she will be hardly recognized by those who know her. She is now forty-one feet over all, eleven feet having been added at the stern and a new living room has been built over this. The interior compartments are all remodelled and the motor power has been more than doubled.

The Civilian Rifle Association of this city have issued a challenge to the P. E. I. Island Inter-maritime Rifle team which has been accepted. The match has been arranged to take place this afternoon at two o'clock at Kensington Range and the following will be the teams: Inter-maritime—Major W. A. Weeks, Capt. B. A. McKinnon, Sgt. E. A. Moore, Sgt. P. Melnis, Sgt. K. Rogers, Sgt. A. McCabe, Pr. J. Landrigan and Pr. J. D. McPhee. Gunner Kennedy will probably shoot for Sgt. Melnis, and Major Jones in place of one of the other members. Civilian Team—Otto Sigurd, H. V. Vaughan, G. E. Hutchison, Major McDonald, R. R. Brown, G. M. Moore, A. N. McKay and W. K. Rogers. Much interest is expected in the outcome of the friendly clash between these two teams, both of which have in the past proved themselves almost indomitable.

MOLYNEUX TRIAL

in court, to the Attorney-General at his request. After the inquest on May 25th I made an examination of the prisoner's son at Henry Campbell's house.

I held it by authority of the Attorney-General and I afterwards sent the evidence to him. He ordered me to examine the boy in the absence of his father. At the time of the inquest I would have received the evidence of Harry Molyneux if the jury had not so strongly objected.

The skin of the neck was removed back about one inch or more from the centre of the throat. Could not tell the amount of force used in making the mark. I do not suggest that the woman was killed by the application of the hand. I do not know what caused her death. Cannot swear the lower marks on the neck were such as to necessarily have any thing to do with her death. Did not see any extravasation of blood in bruise under the ear or in those on the face. The bruise on the forehead was slightly echymosed. We looked upon the facial bruises as having no weight. The body had been buried about 13 days before being exhumed. The time that elapsed between death and exhumation might have had some effect upon the colorings of the marks.

To Mr. Johnson—I have an opinion as to the cause of death formed partly by reasons of what was disclosed at the autopsy, and partly upon sworn evidence given by parties who saw the woman hanging, as to the condition of the face.

John Aitken (sworn). Testified that he was present at the exhumation of the body, and having assisted in its removal.

John McBeth (sworn). Finlay, my son, told me the next morning of Mrs. Molyneux's death and I went about 13 days before being called at the prisoner's father's. He and Henry Campbell were there. I asked prisoner if he noticed anything about her before and he said no. Afterwards Henry Campbell, the prisoner's father and myself went over to Molyneux's. The three above mentioned brought the remains out of the pantry. I went in the pantry and saw a piece of rope hanging to a towel roller attached to the door. I untied it and threw it under a stretcher in the kitchen. I never saw it afterwards. Suppose the rope was eight or nine inches long between the roller and the point of cutting. The total length would perhaps be eight or ten inches. It was a soft rope and appeared to be similar to those around binder twine bags. There were two knots in it. There was a pump in the pantry and a sink behind the door.

About May 1st prisoner complained to me about his wife. Said he had a hard time with her. I said, "You gave her too much of her own way first." He said they were reporting that he had given her a slap in the

mouth. He said he had done so; that she had taken the child and slapped her on the floor and that was why he struck her. On one occasion the prisoner's two sisters and McBeth's two girls were going to McPherson's and the prisoner said to me, he could not talk to anyone on the road or go to a neighbor's house but his wife would be vexed at him.

To Mr. Johnston—Saw a mark on deceased's neck, apparently made by a rope.

John Bruce (sworn). On the night of May 4th was at prisoner's house. Finlay McBeth came to my house and told me what had happened and we went over Henry Campbell and some of the prisoner's children were there. Mr. Campbell took me to the pantry and I saw Mrs. Molyneux on the floor. There was a little blood about her nose and a slight bruise near the chin. As far as I could see her eyes were closed. I saw a piece of rope on the towel rack. After that I went over to the prisoner's father's house to get a lamp.

timid about the place. He said there was nothing to be timid about and he said if he had stayed home the tragedy would not have happened. He said he was a little afraid sometimes. I told the prisoner he was reported that one sent for Dr. McIntyre on account of him beating her. He said there were no bruises on her and he could not understand why she should have sent for him. He told of her dressing up and waiting nearly all day for Dr. McIntyre. She said he met the doctor near Molyneux's and the doctor asked him how his wife was. He replied to the doctor that she was sick and acting strangely at times. My wife asked him "did you ever hit her." He said he slapped her once and also that there was only one other place in the house she could have hung herself and that was upstairs. Prisoner was at our house about two weeks before the tragedy. He was fixing a pump and Mrs. Bruce asked him how his wife was. (The conversation here detailed has already been given by other witnesses.) I told me on one occasion that his wife was making it very unpleasant for him and that sometimes he would rather go away than remain in the house.

To Mr. Mathieson—Prisoner said he had once slapped his wife for throwing the baby on the floor. This happened several years ago.

Court adjourned at half past seven to meet at nine o'clock.
