"From Five to Five-Thirty" was the final offering of the evening. This play was chosen by the adjudicators as the best of the evening and was given high praise. Mrs. Ruby Houle and Mrs. Roy Smallman, were the adjudicators for the evening - Mrs. Houle being spokesman. She complimented the members of the cast of the three plays and said the acting had been exceptionally good. "From Five to Five-Thirty," she stated, "was really moving play. It takes a good play to move an old-timer like me; and I was deeply moved by this one. It was exceptionally well done, and deserves top honors." She complimented Frances Vessey, (Mrs. Treetsop) for her interpretation of the Mother's role.

TOASTED ALMOND ANGEL CAKE\*

1 cup sifted Swans Down Cake Flour 1/4 cup sifted granulated sugar 1/4 cup egg whites 1/4 teaspoon salt 1/4 cup thinly-sliced blanched almonds 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar 1 teaspoon vanilla 1/4 teaspoon almond extract 1/2 cup finely-blended almonds Sift flour once, measure, add 1/4 cup sugar, sift 4 times. Beat egg whites and salt with rotary egg beater or flat wire whisk, when foamy, add cream of tartar and continue beating until stiff enough to hold up in peaks, but not dry. Add remaining sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time; beat after each addition until sugar is just blended. Fold in almonds. Sift about 1/4 cup flour over mixture; fold in lightly. Continue to use all of flour. Turn into ungreased 10-inch angel cake pan. Cut gently through nuts with knife to remove bubbles. Bake in moderate oven (375°F) about 35 minutes, sprinkling almonds quickly over batter after first 10 minutes. Invert pan until cake is cold, then remove the cake carefully from the pan.

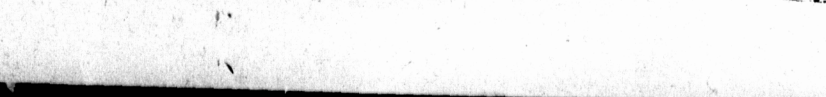
