NICHOLAS' BROTHER NAMED FOR CZAR

HARBIN, June 23—Further successes by the troops of German Baron von Ungern-Sternberg, anti-Bolshevik leader in Siberia, are reported here. His forces are said to have captured Petropavsk, on the trans-Siberian railroad, midway between Irkutsk and China, and to be threatening Chita, capital of the government of the far eastern republic of Siberia. The adviser declare General von Ungern-Sternberg has issued a proclamation looking to the restoration of Grand Duke Michael Alexandrovich, younger brother of former Emperor Nicholas, (whose whereabouts have been a mystery for some time.) The same adviser declare troops sent out from Chita to meet the von Ungern-Sternberg forces, mutilated and ordered to fight the advancing anti-Bolshevik army. The insurgent movement in central Siberia seems to be spreading southward, as insurgent successes at Semipalatinsk and Barnaul southeast of Tomsk, are reported.

SKELETON OF INDIAN FOUND

PORTLAND, Me., June 23—The skeleton of a man, uncovered 75 feet above high water mark at Fort McKinley, Great Diamond Isle this week had been buried more than 100 years in the opinion of Major John Lee Halcombe, commanding officer of the fort. The cheek bones, which were easily traceable, caused him to believe the man was an Indian. There was no evidence of clothing, personal belongings or a coffin. The body was four feet beneath the surface of a knoll through which the cut was being made for laying the railway.

Whey Jelly

One and one-half tablespoon gelatin, one-quarter cup cold water, one-half cup sugar one lemon or orange juice and grated rind two cups whey. SITUATION IN BUSINESS WORLD

LONDON, June 24.—The pointed criticism by Premier W. E. Foster, of New Brunswick, of the Canadian trade representation in London.

Also in this office is Trade Commissioner Wilgress, who is canvassing British merchant firms for Canadian business. The representation of Canadian trade interests in such matters as the present dispute between the Canadian bacon packers and the Ministry of Food is attended to by W. L. Griffith, permanent secretary to the High Commissioner.

WAGE REDUCTION ON C. N. R.

MONTREAL, June 23.—Faced with a direct statement that their unions were expected to acquiesce in wage reduction aggregating \$31,875,000 a year, 110 representatives of Canadian railway employees, who came to Montreal yesterday, are journeying towards their respective homes today to acquaint their union with the facts presented to them by the vice presidents in charge of operations of the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific Railways.

The magnitude of the figures involved is divisible by 150,000 the number of railway employees affected in order to reach the average in which each individual views the personal effect of the schedules proposed by the Canadian railways. The personal equation, reduced to the individual, in the reduction suggested as effective July 1, is \$212.50 a year.

This is arrived at this way: The number of employees of Canadian railways is approximately under existing schedule \$1,700 a year. Thus the aggregate wages paid to Canadian railway employees per annum is \$285,000,000. The reduction promised for July 1 is one per cent, or roughly \$3,375,000. That figure represents a reduction of approximately \$212.50 per year, of \$4.18 per week, in

the average wage of each individual.

Such were the figures which the labor leaders worked out prior to yesterday's meetings. They were also the figures they had in mind when they declined any public statement prior to leaving the city.

\$50,000,000 WORTH OF BOOZE TO FLAVOR OCEAN

NEW YORK, June 23.—The District Attorney's office in New York County has begun proceedings to acquire title in the name of the State of New York to seize liquor worth \$50,000,000 at bootleggers' prices.

After condemnation the liquor probably will be towed in garbage scows to a point off Sandy Hook where the world's greatest cocktail will be compounded. Whether the whole \$50,000,000 will be mixed in one colossal drink or whether it will be doled out to the ocean at the rate of a few thousand barrels a day, is to be settled later.

The thousands of barrels of liquor it dumped all at once beyond the three-mile limit, will not be enough to flavor the surface at the beach. It may, however, perfume the breezes for a few miles.
