In Memoriam

MR. GEORGE WILLIAM SMITH
Mr. George William Smith, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Matthew Smith, was born in New-Castle-on-Tyne, England, and was one of a family of four sons, three of whom emigrated to this country early in life and resided in Belfast, P. E. I. His father and elder brother Matthew were deceased at this time, so the other three brothers came to Canada to try their fortunes in a new land. His mother, who remained in England, died several years later. Of these three boys his brother Joseph died in early manhood, and is buried in St. John's Presbyterian cemetery, Belfast, P. E. I. His mother and brother Peter were also deceased. These three boys were adopted into different homes in Belfast, where they attended school and grew to manhood. George was adopted into the home of the late Lauchlin Ross and his mother, who although she had raised a large family of her own, lavished on him the true affection of a mother. He never forgot the kindness and affection of that home. At the age of seventeen he decided to go to the United States, where he lived with Mr. Ross's brother Samuel while he worked at the employ of D. Eddy Sons Refrigerator Co., Dorchester, Mass. where he remained for 23 years. When he returned to P. E. I. buying a small farm in New Haven. There he lived until his death on April 25th, 1944. His health became impaired in 1938, when he was stricken with diabetes and during the last year of his life he became unable to attend to business in Charlottetown, he suddenly dropped on the floor and died. Besides his younger brother Peter, he is also survived by his wife, Mrs. Mary Lita Ross, Charlottetown, P. E. I. He was an interested worker in Dorchester Temple Baptist Church, which was a member, transferring to the River Baptist Church when he moved to New Haven. He was also a member of Algonquin Masonic Lodge, Dorchester, Mass., transferring later to the Brothers Lodge, Craupaud, P. E. I. His funeral service was held in the Clyde River Baptist Church on June 26th when Mary Katherine daughter of P. and the late Mrs. McKenna, Greely, was the bride of P. E. I. Reginald L. Hennebery with Mrs. E. J. Hennebery, Morell P. E. I. The bridal couple entered the church to the strains of Lohengrin's Wedding March played by Mr. E. J. Hennebery, a former teacher of the bride. The bride was attended by her sister Mrs. Lita Ross, who was the groom was ably supported by Sgt. Merrill McAlduff also a member of the P. E. I. Highlanders. In her father's presence the bride looked lovely in her floor length white satin gown, fashioned in the style of Queen Victoria, and panels in the skirt. She wore a time up veil and carried an arm bouquet of American Beauty roses and Baby's Breath. WILL AWARD PRIZE FOR BEST SCRIPT

TORONTO, July 31 (CP) - The Canadian Women's Press Club announced today that the annual Memorial Award will be made in 1944-45 in the field of radio writing. This is the first time in the 15 year history of the award that radio writing has been considered. The award in the form of an engraved gold medal and a cheque for \$25, has been made in previous years for articles, short stories, biographical sketches, or similar types of magazine or news writing. Winner of the 1943-44 award was Margaret Ecker of the London Evening Standard. The award is given by the Canadian Press Bureau of the Canadian Press. 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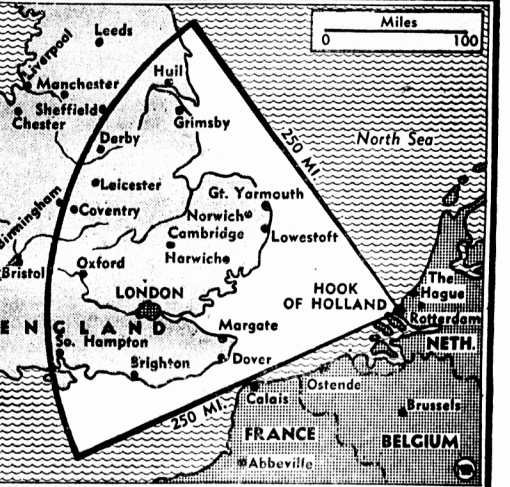
