EASTERN NOTES.—The short evenings and cool nights remind us that summer is past, autumn is upon us, and the annual migration of our summer visitors to more southern latitudes is now going on. Cheaper fares, faster communication, marriages and intermarriages, business and recreation, have increased the travel between the two countries in a remarkable degree and could the tariff walls be lowered the increase in business would be surprising. Not many years ago the young woman from East Point who wished to visit that Mecca of the East—Boston—who wished to share in the good times, the high wages and the husbands, supposed to abound there in unlimited profusion, had to trust her life to the accommodations to be found in a Gloucester fishing vessel bound home with a trip of mackerel. The trip generally took from one week to three, according to the winds and the weather, and the experience of the female passengers in beating against the south easterly on the Nova Scotia coast, can be better imagined than described. Now the coy maiden from the East, who harbors the same bright anticipations, who sees so many pictures of bliss painted by fancy, who longs to exchange her simple country life for the splash and dash, the hurry and bustle of the city, has simply to step aboard the cars in Souris, and in twenty six hours she rolls into Boston, without the necessity of paying but little tribute to Neptune, like her sister of a few decades ago, as the palatial Northumberland will convey her in a few hours from Summerside to the shores of New Brunswick.—Harvesting is nearly concluded: the crop is a grand one, and already that useful and indispensable man, James E. Leet, is working among the farmers with his threshing mill and cleaner.—Not much is doing in the fishing line at present. There are some mackerel still on the North Side, and a few were taken on Rock Barra lately, but they are too far off the shore for small boats to do much with them. There are no hake on the South Side at present and the fishermen are preparing for fall cod-fish which will soon put in appearance. They come in pursuit of the capelin, which are now arriving on our shores in immense numbers, and force their way into our rivers and ponds where they spend the winter. There is a good demand here for hake this fall, and a better price than for some years.
