SALE WAS SUCCESSFUL.—As the result of the Anniversary Sale at Prowse Brothers, Limited, Friday and Saturday the Prince Edward Island Hospital, the Charlottetown Hospital, the P. E. I. Protestant Orphanage and St. Vincent's Orphanage received the sum of \$15,172 each, a total of \$60,688. This amount is ten per cent of the proceeds. Friday's business was fairly good but the down pour of rain on Saturday interfered greatly with the sale. From the point of view of sales the Anniversary was a greater success than in previous years but prices are considerably lower than in 1919.

Drunken Drivers Will Go To Jail

BOSTON, May 4.—The 146th annual session of the legislature of Massachusetts prorogued last night.

One measure adopted, of more than state-wide interest, was the so-called "drunken driver" bill, making mandatory jail sentences for drunken driving when the offence occurs within six months of a previous offence. The legislature voted against the child labor amendment to the Federal constitution.

\$30,000 Trailed

PARIS, May 4.—The police searches in connection with the alleged Communist ambush of Republican youths in the Rue Darnemont on April 24, have been especially thorough in the case of Suzanne Girault, who represents the "Eye of Moscow" in the French Communist world and is said to wield unlimited authority over her Red adherents.

Le Matin today says that among the things seized in her apartment which is described as luxurious, were accounts showing that she had received from Moscow during the last few months \$30,000, which had been distributed among various persons. The receipts also were found, but the names were unfamiliar to the police.

King To Open Fair

LONDON, May 4.—King George V. will celebrate his fifty-third anniversary as ruler on Wednesday, May 6, by opening the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley. The exhibition will represent the manifold activities of the nation's dominions, colonies and overseas dependencies. The King's opening address will be broadcast by wireless to thousands of listeners throughout the British Isles.
