The Man From Nowhere Whips Parker

Y., Sept. 6 (AP)—Tom Brown, Jr., of San Francisco, the young man who came out of nowhere to thrill the galleries at Wimbledon this summer, carried his meteoric career a long step forward today when he trounced Frank Parker, the two-time defending champion, in a gruelling five-set match in the United States national championship. The battle of the bulge veteran turned into a two-set lead, faltered while the defending titleholder swept through the next two, and then turned on all his tremendous power to capture the decisive set and the match, 6-4, 6-8, 3-6, 6-1.

The triumph catapulted the 22-year-old Coast star into the semi-finals, where tomorrow he will clash with Gardner Mulloy, veteran star from Miami, Fla., who won his quarter-final match with Pancho Segura, the electrifying Ecuadorian, by scores of 4-6, 6-2, 12-10, 6-3. In the opposite semi-final Jack Kramer of Los Angeles, tournament favorite, will tie into another giant, young Bob Fawcett, a 20-year-old Californian of the University of Southern California. Brown, given but little chance against the 30-year-old opponent played perhaps the greatest tennis yet seen in the tournament as he parried the best shots and gave the mechanical man one of the worst trouncings he ever received.

In the day's only women's match, Doris Hart of Miami scored a somewhat one-sided victory over Mrs. Mary Arnold Prentiss of Los Angeles, 6-3, 6-2, to reach the finals. Her opponent Sunday will depend upon the outcome of the quarter-final clash between Patricia Beitz of Los Angeles and Mrs. Patricia Ganning Todd of La Jolla, Calif.
