grounds enclosure, but there will be no vehicular traffic in this enclosure.

On the steps of the Provincial Building the Principals of the city schools and the Scout officer will be presented to His Excellency. The party will then proceed to the public function in the Confederation Chamber, where addresses of welcome on behalf of the Provincial Government and the City Corporation will be read by Premier Stewart and Mayor Prowse, to which His Excellency will reply. The members of the Government and City Council and the president and executive of the Canadian Legion will then be presented.

From the Provincial Building the Governor General and party will proceed by way of Richmond and Queen Streets to the Harris Memorial Art Gallery and Provincial Library. From there they will go, by way of Grafton, Weymouth and Fitzroy Streets, to the Prince Edward Island Hospital, thence by way of Fitzroy and Rochford Streets to the Charlottetown Hospital.

Following these visits an inspection will be made of the Provincial Sanatorium, which will be reached by way of Rochford Street, Brighton Road and North River Road. Thence the party will proceed by way of North River Road and Victoria Park to the old Government House, where luncheon will be served at 1 p.m.

At 2:30 a visit to the Experimental Station will be made, where His Excellency will plant a maple tree. The party will then proceed to the fox ranch of Lieut. Col. Andrew, M. M., East Royalty, thence back to Government House at 4 p.m. where a reception will be held, for which function numerous invitations have been issued.

His Excellency will then return to his train. At 8:30 he will be guest of honour at a dinner given by the Provincial Government at the Canadian National Hotel.

On Tuesday morning at 10:15 the Governor General and party, accompanied by the Lieut. Governor and staff, Premier Stewart and members of the Government, will proceed by way of Malpeque Road to Kensington and Summerside. On arrival at Kensington at 11:30 a reception by the Mayor and citizens will be given and an address will be read in the town hall. The party will reach Summerside at 12:30. A reception will be held at the Capitol Theatre where His Excellency will be presented with an address of welcome by Mayor Lidstone.

After luncheon at 1:30 at the Clifton Hotel and a visit to the schools and Prince County Hospital, the vice regal party will leave Summerside at 3 p.m. by way of Bedouque, Albany, Tryon and Victoria. At the latter place a brief stop will be made and a formal welcome will be extended to His Excellency in the Victoria hall. The party will then return to Charlottetown by way of Bonshaw, reaching Government House, at or about 5:30, where tea will be served. His Excellency will then return to his train, which leaves for the mainland at 10 p.m. Tuesday. Miramichi and the North Shore towns of New Brunswick will be visited while en route to Ottawa.

The Rev. A. C. Vincent commended at the morning service a series of sermons on "The Supernatural Jesus," seeking the sources for his theme from the gospel of St. Matthew. The past few years have marked an increasing and deepening interest in the Jesus of the Gospels, an interest perhaps more larger in the humanity of Jesus. This morning the speaker continued, the substance of his thought would be along the line of the Jesus of the Gospel in His divine, His supernatural character.

The evening sermon was the first of a short series on the epistle of St. James. The ordinance of the Lord's Supper was observed at the evening service.

The Sunday School meeting at 2:30 p. m. was largely attended in all classes.

The music of the day included Coleridge Taylor's "O Ye that love the Lord," Sullivan's "Savior, Thy children keep," and Shelley's "Savior, again to Thy dear name."

Work On Mt'l. Terminals Postponed

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 4.—Postponement for the present of further expenditures upon the Montreal Terminals plans of the Canadian National Railways has been decided upon after careful consideration at a conference with the Government, according to a statement issued today by Sir Henry Thornton, chairman and President of the Canadian National Railways. The statement follows:

"In view of the very serious decrease in railway revenues, due to the depression in world trade, which has equally affected all railways on the North American continent, the Canadian National Railway management has of necessity been giving very serious consideration to the curtailment of expenditures in every possible direction. It is now apparent that the railway will be able to provide from earnings little, if any, towards the fifty-seven millions required to meet interest charges. In addition, there are other large expenditures necessary to the operation of the railway itself to be provided for during the current year. In view of this, and the unsettled state of international financing, the management, after careful consideration and after conference with the government, has decided to postpone for the present, further expenditures upon the Montreal terminal plans of the railway. The management takes this step with regret, but considers it necessary in view of the unprecedented demands of the general situation. It does not mean, that the work will be closed down entirely. There are certain features of the course of construction that will require to be completed. This will continue to provide employment for a considerable number of men for some time to come. Meanwhile, the management wishes to point out that the present action involves suspension only and we are looking forward to the time when a general improvement of business and the stabilizing of the financial situation will allow us to complete the plans which we have in view.

Good Beef Caused War

OTTAWA, Oct. 4.—One of the most interesting records of the early days of Spanish occupation of America has just come to light through the discovery in dusty archives of half-forgotten Spanish libraries of several volumes of records of Indian tribal customs and practices.

It is one of these which relates how an enterprising Spanish meat vendor conceived the idea of selling beef to the Indians all nicely cooked, seasoned and ready to serve. It proved a good idea, too good in fact. In those days, as at present, the women did the buying for the home. However, they seemed to have a fine appreciation of merit because the records show they would buy the delicious cooked beef only for themselves, take it home and eat it. Of course the men of the tribe liked it just as well as their women, but it seemingly was beneath their dignity to do the buying for themselves.

When they couldn't get their wives or women to buy this cooked beef for them they, as we say today, "read the riot act," and this failing in effect actually started war against the Spanish. But in those days war was a chief pastime. These records show that the Spanish themselves started wars on the Indians because only one banana in every 1000 delivered by them was ripe, and on another occasion because the Indians were selling them chickens infected with the plague.
