OTTAWA, Sept. 7.—From Vancouver to Sydney credentials are being received from delegates who will attend this year's Dominion Trades and Labor Congress at Winnipeg. The Congress opens on September 13 and is expected to continue throughout the entire week, the closing session coming on Saturday afternoon. Resolutions touching on almost every subject of interest to labor men have been received, and it is expected that the chief interest will centre around discussions on industrial disputes, cost of living, Workmen's Compensation Acts and Immigration of workmen to Canada. Many workers in this country feel that labor is being brought in from other countries without any reasonable prospect of work being found for them on their arrival here. Political activities of the workers are also expected to be freely discussed.
