Quake May Lead To New Construction

(Canadian Press)
VICTORIA, B. C., Sept. 17.—When the causes of the Tokio and Yokohama disaster are finally catalogued and analyzed, it will probably be found, according to construction men who have spent much time in Japan, that one factor which acted as a terribly effective accomplice to the forces of destruction was the form of building construction in the most densely inhabited region of Japan.

Just as the San Francisco earthquake and the nearly all similar catastrophes carried with them a moral and lesson, so also is the Japanese calamity likely to point a way to something better in the future—sounder buildings more scientifically constructed, designed according to the pattern of the Occident. This will mean incidentally the importation of vast quantities of building materials such as Canada and the United States are able to provide, until such time as Japan has perfected means of obtaining her requirements at home. Lumber, however, Japan will probably always need and from now on her purchases from Canada should steadily increase.

The fact that the majority of the buildings of Tokio and Yokohama were unable to withstand the earth tremor does not mean that the attention has been given in Japan to the importance of considering the earthquake possibilities when building. Through the centuries Japan has been forced to pay attention to earthquakes and to provide against them. Probably no country in the world has more men trained in the science of seismology than Japan, and many of these men stand in the foremost ranks of the world. They have given the advantage of their advice to cities throughout Japan with the result that nearly all Japanese cities have building codes which limit the height of buildings to 100 shaku or feet, averaging about eight stories. These restrictions were dictated by a regard for traffic congestion, ventilation and other factors, but the earthquake problem was unquestionably the dominating consideration.

It is doubtful whether any form of construction could have successfully withstood the force of the recent earthquake in Japan under the most intense conditions, but investigation will probably disclose, it is believed, that most of the smaller buildings and the older structures of native construction would not have a chance to survive an earthquake of much less severity. In spite of the warning of scientists, many thousands of the Japanese houses and business buildings have been erected with a total disregard for the importance of guarding against the effects of earthquakes.

Many visitors in Japan who gain their impressions from monetary observation have remarked on the suggestion of strength in the construction of Japanese houses, and they have taken it for granted that heavy and solid roofs were provided as a precaution against "quake." The fact, however, is that these roofs are supported by such flimsy walls and foundations that most of the earthquake casualties in Japan have been caused in the past by their crashing to the ground at the first rumble of an earth tremor of unusual violence. Native construction is now regarded as its own worst enemy in the event of earthquakes.

During recent years the Occidental style of building has been gaining favor in Japan and the recent disaster is expected to result in a general revolution of construction methods, with elimination of the old native plan and adoption of steel and reinforced concrete types of buildings, of light skeleton structure, such as is popular in Canada and the United States. Japanese may be able to improve on this form of construction, but it seems certain Japan will never return to the old style.

Seventy Claimants For Vast Fortune

(By Dominion News Service)
LONDON, Sept. 17.—Seventy people in Lancashire to say nothing of one or two in Australia, New Zealand and Texas, are claimants of the "Fazackerley Millions"—the landed estate left in Lancashire and London by Nicholas Fazackerley former M. P., for Preston, who died in 1767.

The claimants state that the branch of the family to which the testator bequeathed his wealth can show no further direct heirs, and the estate which has now reached the enormous value of \$85,000,000, should therefore be shared among descendants of other branches.

Whether they will succeed in the Courts remains to be seen, but by means of minute investigations of the mysteries of family trees and the scouring and cleaning of time-worn tomb stones in disused churchyards, they have systematically collected evidence to substantiate their bid for wealth.

The researchers, to maintain which the claimants pay weekly subscriptions of \$1.00, are not yet complete, and there is no truth in reports that an eminent K. C. has already been briefed.

A sum of \$10,000 and a vast amount of trouble have been expended in the last two years by the claimants in tracing their ancestry and classifying their evidence.

They have built up a barrier of secrecy around the mystery, but it is believed that the majority of the claimants entertain high hopes of becoming owners of yachts and motor cars.

The extent to which the estate has increased in value, may be measured by the fact that it is believed that the site of the Boodle docks is part of the land concerned in the will, the rest being situated in other Liverpool districts, including Prescott and Fazackerley, and in London.

That the evidence is almost ripe for Court presentation is shown by the fact that three applications have been received within the past ten days from Liverpool and Everton people desiring of linking up claims with those now being pressed forward.

Forty of the claimants are Liverpool people and thirty more are Prestonians. Sensational developments are expected.

Tex Rickard Ready To Stage Another

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—Tex Rickard who promoted the Dempsey-Firpo bout last night announced at the close of the drama that he was ready to stage another bout between champion and his Argentine challenger next summer and a bout between Firpo and Harry Wills, American negro. Of tonight's contest Rickard said:

"It was one of the greatest fights in the history of the ring. It gave me the thrill of my life."

Jack Dempsey admitted tonight that he had been in his moments of greatest victory. He sat in his dressing

Firpo, that he never had received such a soaking in his life. "I won as I thought I would," said Jack. "but I can truthfully say that I never had such a fight in all my life. When he socked me on the chin in the first round knocking me through the ropes after I had knocked him down I thought my finish had come.

"Firpo was dangerous every second. I hit him with everything I had and I certainly was surprised when he continued to crawl off the floor.

"He is game and the hardest fighter I ever met. It was the first time I was knocked down since I became champion and I'll never forget it. I saw eight million stars when I got that punch on the chin that came nearly knocking me out of the ring."

What Firpo said.

Luis Angel Firpo was as silent and somber in defeat tonight as he had been in his moments of greatest victory. He sat in his dressing

room after the bout in an apparent daze, unable to realize the swift-ness with which he had been beaten.

At first he refused to talk but after a moment, he mumbled: "I did the best I could. Dempsey was the better man. I never have felt such blows as he gave me."

He declared he would be ready to take another shot at the heavy-weight championship of the world in a year. "I will be back," he said. Firpo made the following statement:

"In a year I will be back again. Tonight I feel I made a creditable showing. I did what no other man has done to Jack Dempsey, the champion. I knocked him down. I knocked him outside of the ropes. I came within an ace of winning the championship in the first round.

"I will take a motor trip to Canada. Then I'll go to my home in Buenos Aires and when I come back I will be better prepared to fight the champion."

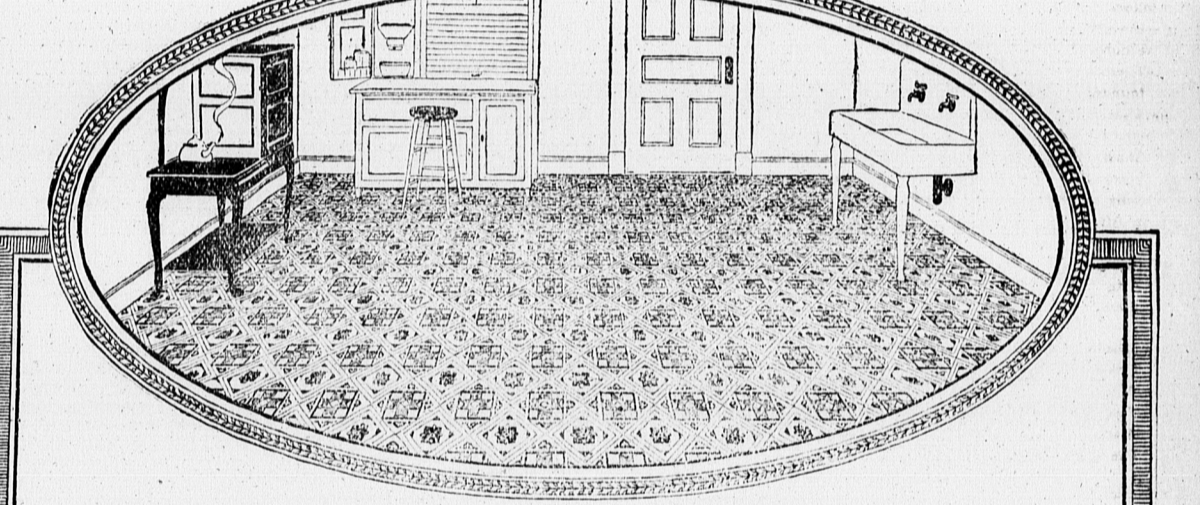

Dempsey's Share of Gate \$450,000

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—Approximately \$5,000 people paid \$1,200,000 to see the bout at the Polo Grounds tonight, according to unofficial estimates of ringside observers. Tex Rickard, promoter of the bout, did not make any calculation of the attendance or receipts, but it is estimated that 5,000 more people, besides the 37,000 who paid, were inside the park this night including policemen, firemen, ushers, popvenders and other employees. On the basis of receipts of \$1,200,000 Dempsey's share, 37 1/2 per cent., is \$450,000, and Firpo's share, 12 1/2 per cent., \$150,000. The fighters divided 50 per cent., of the total receipts.

TOWN DESTROYED BY TIDAL WAVE

MEXICALI, Lower California Sept. 13.—Wireless messages received here late today report the destruction by a tidal wave of San Jose de Cabo, a small fishing town on the west coast of Lower California, just above Cape San Lucas. The number of lives lost is not known.

Most of the 500 inhabitants of the town are believed to have escaped to higher ground when the tidal wave swept over the place yesterday, according to radio advices sent out by a steamer which cleared Cape Lucas shortly before the catastrophe.

Steamers carrying merchandise to Guaymas, which had cleared the cape in time to escape destruction or damage in the wave, have been ordered to return to the message said. One of the vessels, it was said, carried 300 laborers for the cotton field near here.
