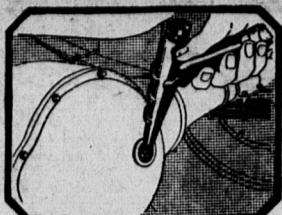

#### LEMON FILLING

The following filling is good either for pies or cakes: Mix three-fourths cup of sugar, two table-spoons each of flour and cornstarch and a third teaspoon salt. When well blended, add slowly a cup of boiling water and cook over the fire, stirring constantly until the mixture is thick enough to pile

when dropped from a spoon. Cook fifteen minutes longer in a double boiler, else the starch will taste raw. Then beat in one or two egg yolks; a teaspoon butter; three table-spoons lemon juice and the grated yellow rind of half a lemon. If using the filling for cake, let it cool before blending. Add slowly a cup of boiling water and cook over the fire, stirring constantly until the mixture is thick enough to pile

#### 48 YEARS IN MINE

(By British United Press) LONDON, July 8.—Jack Harris, a pitman who worked underground for 48 years in the same pit without ever seeing the coal face, has just retired on the eve of his 70th year. He was employed at the Newstead Colliery, near Nottingham, as an onsetter, and was not once late for work.

Mr. Harris said the other day that he never had any desire to go near the coal face, but kept to his post at the pit bottom. Although he had signalled men and coal daily all through 48 years, he never had an accident. Of this record he was proud, and his employers, the Staveley Coal Company has sent him a special complimentary letter.

This veteran has been a member of the Notts Miners' Association for 38 years. He was 11 years old when he began work below, and his uncles contribution was then three cents a week. He never went to school, but taught himself to read and write after he began to work.

### Saxon Fights Norman

(By British United Press) LONDON, July 8.—Fair-haired Saxons, their scarlet cloaks waving in the wind, swung great two-handed swords against mailed Normans, who met the other day in a realistic "battle" for Hastings Castle.

The "fight" raged on the castle walls and on the crumbling stones placed in position by the Normans who came to Hastings in 1066. It was part of the pageant celebrating the ninth centenary of the birth of William the Conqueror. French representatives from Dieppe, Rouen, Falaise, Deauville and Paris attended.

W. H. Dyer, in the part of Count d'eu, led the Norman forces, who sought to scale the castle walls, and after many "casualties" kept the truce was proclaimed by hand-shaking among the combatants. The scene of the battle of 1066, where Battle Abbey now stands, was visited, and the party halted on the Old London road by a crab-apple tree where the Saxon army was drawn up.

The Marquis de Rochethulon et Grante led the French delegates, bearing him a replica of the Conqueror's standard, three golden lions on a crimson shield, copied from the Bayeux tapestry. After a lapse of nearly 900 years the standard was flown again where the Conqueror planted it on Standard Hill on the route of the march from the landing-place at Pevensey to Hastings.

### Three Previous Winners Reach The Semi-Finals

HAMILTON, Ont., July 8.—Three previous winners of the Canadian amateur golf championship reached the semi-finals today when in the third round matches they emerged victorious. Two of them, Frank Thompson, of Chicago, and Sandy Somerville, of London, had comparatively easy wins, securing big leads in the morning, which were too much for their respective opponents, P. G. Hoblitzel, of Lambton, and W. H. Gardner, of Buffalo to overcome in the afternoon, although the two losers played the better golf in the afternoon.

Don Carrick of Scarborough, Toronto, had a strenuous struggle to dispose of Norman Scott, Montreal, finally winning 2 and 1. He had a one-hole lead going out in the afternoon, but was one in arrears at the ninth and he did not square the match until the fifteenth. Here Scott cracked and Carrick won three to one.

Carrick will meet Somerville tomorrow, while Thompson tackles Maurice J. McCarthy of Brooklyn, who today eliminated Stanley Thompson of Mississauga, Toronto, 3 and 2. Thompson was one up at noon, but on each nine in the afternoon he had losing streaks of three holes each and this caused his downfall.

### Hamilton Cadets Capture First 3 Places At Bisley

BISLEY CAMP, Eng., July 8.—The cadets from Hamilton, Ont., here with the Canadian team, put in splendid individual performances on the Bisley ranges during the early part of the National Rifle Association's meeting here.

The first three places in the service rifle shoot for the N. R. A.'s special badge were all captured by Hamilton cadets—Capt. Hunter, Lieut. Matchett and Lieut. Hilsen, each scoring 99 out of a possible 100. They shot off again for the badge of Capt. Hunter won Lieut. Hilsen got a possible 35 in one of the sweepstakes, as did Capt. Hunter and Lieut. Matchett, and in addition Hilsen recorded 34 out of 35 in a snap shooting contest.

The Canadian Bisley team itself will finally swing into serious competition tomorrow, with the shooting of the Donegal Challenge Cup and its connected qualifier, and the Conan Doyle challenge statuette, all service rifle events. The three are squadded competitions. In the Donegal and qualifier ten shots will be fired at 200 yards; in the Conan Doyle seven shots will be fired at 200 and 500 yards.

### NAVAL MUSEUM FOR ENGLAND

(By British United Press) LONDON, July 8.—A National Naval and Nautical Museum, the first of its kind in England, is to be founded at Queen's House, Greenwich.

A magnificent start has been given to the new venture by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, who will hand over the entire contents of the Royal Naval Museum, including:— The Chatham chest dating back to the Armada. Drake's Ostrolobe. Compass and dipping needle of Captain Cook.

The Franklin relics. Model of the ship of Trafalgar. Uniform of Sir Charles Napier. West collection of Nelson relics. Admiralty scale models of British battleships from 1670 to 1870. Nelson relics and other treasures now in the Painted Hall.

There will also be a collection of plans of ships built for the Navy from the middle of the 17th century, a series, unequalled in any other country and models will illustrate the progress of naval construction from the Devastation to the Dreadnought.

### IN MEMORIAM

#### MR. WILLIAM JENKINS

Mr. William Jenkins who recently passed away at his residence, Vernon had just completed on the preceding Sunday, (June 26) his 80th year. While living a very quiet and retired life in recent years he had been around as usual till a week from his death. He was very much distressed but bore his sufferings with very great patience and Christian fortitude. Everything that loving affection and skilled attention could do failed to check an incurable heart affection. He was perfectly resigned and prepared for the call when it came to him. An exemplary parent in the home, a very liberal and faithful supporter of the Methodist Church, now the United Church, of Cherry Valley, very much esteemed and respected in the life of the community and province in general his death is very deeply regretted.

The late Mr. Jenkins was married twice. His first wife, Miss M. E. Dingwell of Little River, died 26 years ago. He was married later in life to Mrs. Herring of Mary Harbour who predeceased him, about three years ago. His family surviving him are all from the first marriage. The sons are: Dingwell, Truman, and William A., all residing at Vernon, and Max in British Columbia, who was unable to come home. The daughters are Mrs. J. M. McLeod of Vernon Bridge, Mrs. W. J. McEachern of Mt. Albion, and Mrs. Louise Hayden of Earncliffe. Three brothers also survive, Robert, George and Boswell of Mount Albion. His surviving sisters are Mrs. Abigail Carver of Hazelbrook, and Mrs. Henry Smallwood of Bunbury. The funeral services were held from the residence of his son, Mr. W. A. Jenkins to Cherry Valley Cemetery on Friday afternoon last, and were conducted by Rev. G. A. Grant and the choir of Cherry Valley United Church assisted by Mrs. George McLeod of Montreal and other friends.
