view of the heavy export of gold which has already taken place and the size of the crops, it is probable that this will result in the hardening of money rates before long. The Secretary of the Treasury, however, has indicated a willingness to assist the needs of the banks as much as possible, in the same manner as was done last year.

### ROCK ISLAND.

The proposed plan of re-organization of the Rock Island Railroad has fallen through. This is stated to be due to the fact that the underwriting syndicate formed to provide the proposed assessment on the common stock had withdrawn, owing to doubt as to whether the road itself could earn the dividend in the first year on the contemplated new preferred stock. There was also, however, considerable dissatisfaction with the plan by the Collateral Trust 4 per cent. Bondholders, who objected to giving up part of their present collateral securities of the Rock Island system and much doubt as to how the problem confronting the road can be worked out. If it should result in a receivership old Rock Island Railway, and a consequent handling of the re-organization by a committee of the Rock Island refunding 4 per cent. bondholders, it might prove a much less desirable situation for the collateral trust bondholders (who would in that event become practically common stock holders in the old railway) than the plan which has just been abandoned.

### FOREIGN TRADE.

Foreign trade figures of the Government for the year ended June 30th are just at hand. The aggregate runs to \$4,258,795,736 and is only slightly below that of the preceding year. In recent months, however, imports have increased and exports decreased, so that for the year this was an excess of exports of only \$470,000,000 compared with \$653,000,000 in the preceding year. It will probably be some weeks yet before the anti-trust legislation can be enacted and there may be many further modifications. The decision in the rate case has not been rendered and the Interstate Commerce Commission is continuing to struggle with the question. The decision is still expected almost daily. Meanwhile the long delay has been a hardship to the country. The demands for an increased wage schedule by the employees of the railroads west of Chicago, which has been threatening for some time past and to which we referred in our last letter, has been submitted to the Government Board of Mediation for adjustment. None of the matters mentioned above have been of an encouraging character and it is not surprising that under such circumstances the market has dragged. Indeed, it is rather surprising that it has not been much weaker. The point of encouragement in the present situation is the prospect of an ample harvest this year which will furnish traffic for our railroads and stimulate our industries, while there is the fact that little by little and through a

New limitations by which "gold school" manipulation now finds itself surrounded, making the tape reading experts more efficient in interpreting movements in the stock market than during the halcyon days of the Keene era. Actual news developments constitute a more potent factor than in the past. Careful examination indicates that one of the chief reasons for this is that news itself is much less susceptible to manipulation. Of paramount weight in this respect, is the keener general appreciation of market factors, fundamental and otherwise, a condition that developed through educational campaigns lately conducted by the commercial and stock market situations. It is our conviction that operators who ignore news, technique and facts and rely solely on the "pump and dump" method, will not be rewarded with as great a percentage of success as heretofore.

U. S. Steel is being taken out of the market, according to high grade sources. Upon all declines, it is said the stock is well taken.

Foreign liquidation is understood now to total about one half billion dollars of American Securities, following the recent war troubles. Continuance of reactionary tendencies is suggested by foreign news, crop damage reported and Washington's attitude.
