RUSSIA'S FINANCES

ST. PETERSBURG, March 6.—General debate on the budget of 1909 began today in the Duma, with a program of speeches by the president of the budget committee, M. Alexeiev, the Constitutional Democrat member, M. Shengareff, which lasted throughout the entire afternoon and evening sessions. The principal criticism was levelled against the disproportionate amount of the military appropriation as compared with that for agricultural purposes; the expensive conditions of the last loan, and the absence of strict economy which Russian finances demanded. M. Alexeiev showed that expenditures had increased one hundred and thirty eight million in the last two years, as compared with an earlier annual average of forty million. He said that forty three and a half per cent of the budget estimates were devoted to military purposes and twelve and one half per cent, to education, agrarian reform, etc. It would be a most urgent financial task to find money for agrarian reform, the colonization of Siberia and the improvement of the condition of workmen, particularly workmen's insurance, and that other expenditures, such as for the navy and railroads, must be deferred. He called attention to the unfavorable change in the balance of trade, which, he said, was due to the steadily increasing imports and the falling off in exports. In conclusion, he declared that the record of the last loans constituted a chronicle of the death of Russian credit. M. Miengareff pointed out that the expenditures of the minister of war and interior and of the prison department had increased fifty per cent those of the ministries of education and agriculture one-half per cent. He demanded a reduction of the peace strength of the army.

Finance Minister Kokovsov, in reply, concealed the justice of the criticism of the military expenditure, and declared that no further allowance should be allowed. The last loan, he said, had been floated under difficulties, and with the war cloud hanging over the Balkans delay was impossible. Nevertheless, the terms were far better than those of the previous loan, and none could have been obtained under more favorable conditions. The minister declared that despite the effect of the war with Japan, the internal disorders, and the international

al unrest arising from the troubles in Morocco and the Balkans, Russian credit was now steadily improving. Foreign investors, he declared in conclusion, had confidence in the third Duma, and if the Duma and the administration would co-operate loyally the credit of the country would soon be restored to a condition worthy of a great state.

GRAHAM BELL DENIES AEROPLANE STORY

SYDNEY, March 6.—An Associated Press dispatch dated from New York March 2nd, says:
 "An American aeroplane modelled somewhat on the lines of the aeroplane 'Silver Dart,' which recently made several sensational flights over the ice surface of the Bras d'Or lakes, will be built under the auspices of the Aerial Experimental association of which Dr. Alexander Graham Bell is chairman and shipped to England to compete in the race for aeroplanes across the English channel. In reply to a query by The Herald, Dr. Bell said:
 "Dispatch has no foundation. None of us have any intention of competing for the British race you refer to. The association, as its name implies, is only for experimental purposes."

'WIRELESS' PREVENT TRAIN WRECKS.

CHICAGO, Ill., March 6.—Messages were sent yesterday by wireless telegraph between a Lake Shore train moving sixty miles an hour and instruments in other stations. This is the first time that such a feat has ever been accomplished. Forty miles out of Chicago a truck broke and a special train was called by wireless from Elkhart.
 W. J. Dalry, general passenger agent of the Lake Shore, said the success of the experiment meant much in eliminating train accidents.
 "Our instrument is working in good shape," said Frederic Sammis, Marconi's first assistant, who was on the special train.
