The following are the City market prices:—Potatoes per bus, twenty one to twenty five cents; black oats per bus, forty one cents; white oats per bus, thirty nine cents; hay pressed per ton, ten dollars and loose per cwt, forty-five; straw pressed per ton, five to six dollars and loose per cwt, thirty cents; butter per lb, nineteen to twenty cents; eggs per doz, twenty-three to twenty-four cents and pork per lb, nine cents.
