Three passengers in the car were injured, but reports last night from the Prince County Hospital at Summerside, where they were taken, indicated that their injuries were not serious. It is expected they will be released over the week-end. The injured, all from Summerside, are Mrs. Archie Sharp, Mrs. Robert Phillips and Mrs. William Smith.

Funeral services for Mr. Phillips will be held at Summerside Sunday afternoon.
