Memorial Service At Geddie Memorial Church

One of the most impressive Memorial services, in memory of those who gave up their lives in the great war, was held on Sunday afternoon, Nov. 8th at the old historic "Geddie Memorial" church. Rev. Dr. Genge of Kensington delivered the address his subject was "Memorial Stones" in which he said that a nation's greatness was the result of her national deeds of sacrifice and because we had paid the price, from a dominion we had been lifted to the status of empire. The heroic deeds of our boys, the sufferings and sacrifices should give us a greater incentive to live for nobler things, and make Canada truly great. Only a few years ago, the only monuments in our country, was the WolfeMontcalm stone at Quebec. These were both of men of other lands, who died in the struggle for ownership of Canada. Today, even city and hamlet have their marble and granite shafts, to tell of rich Canadian blood, that have been poured out to make the world free and democratic, shall we only have the old chiseled marble to answer and memorial days to stimulate the blood of national decline, or shall we catch the spirit of McKee and grasp the torch of liberty, thrown to us in the immortal challenge of dying men, and wave it high so that its illumination may reveal to us not battle fields strewn with slain, but the spirit of the immortal legions of our sons, ready to crown us victors with themselves. Keep the history before you, give courage its unstinted praise, live to be worthy of the heritage bought at so great a price, and when your children shall ask "What mean ye by these stones" you will be able to answer in a nation's growth and power. These are the prices paid for national honor and prestige. The Kensington quartette rendered a fitting selection, and Mr. Seldon Sample sang a beautiful solo by request.

At the close of the address the Honor Roll was unveiled and the names called both of dead and living and as the names of the dead were called, Dr. Genge in fitting remarks said "Honorably discharged." The honor roll in the Geddie Memorial church is a work of art, beautifully executed by Mr. Scarborough of Charlottetown.

The address and service will long be remembered by the people of French River and vicinity and an inspiration will be a lasting power for good in the hearts of young and old. The names of the Honor Roll are as follows:
