WAR ANNIVERSARY—Thursday marked the sixtieth anniversary of the passing through Moncton en route to Halifax of the members of the first Canadian railway contingent, recruited from all parts of Canada to perform railway work in France and Flanders during the operations of the Great War. The unit, which was known officially as the 58th Broad Gauge Railway Operating Company, was made up of locomotive engineers, train conductors, firemen and brakemen, with a sprinkling of machinists from all the railways in Canada. Captain Kendall, of North Bay, Ont., was the officer commanding. Among the Maritime railway men who formed the unit John F. Leightizer, of Moncton, was Sergeant-Major, and is now master mechanic of the C. N. Settlers Clear Many Acres Of Land In Quebec

QUEBEC, Que., March 4.—(By the Canadian Press)—Eleven thousand acres of land were cleared of roots, branches, rocks, stones and weeds in Chicoutimi, the North Shore, Gaspé and Bonaventure, Lake St. John Lotbinière and Temiscouata during the past year by 3,447 families who were placed on the land through the Department of Colonization, it was reported recently and as a result this land will be ready for sowing next spring.

Two thousand of these families are spending the winter on the land, for which purpose 1,836 houses were built during last summer and autumn, while 81 miles of roads were constructed, the Government supplying the materials in all cases.

In addition to the 3,447 families who have returned to the land, the agricultural population of the Province increased by 1,700 during the past year, among them a number of repatriated Canadians, and an extra 13,500 acres of land was sown.

Hon. Hector Laferte, Minister of Colonization, Mines and Fisheries when giving this information recently, added that an inventory of all abandoned farm lots which are for sale was to be made by a commission consisting of three members in order to aid the "back to the land" campaign.

Shanghai Mixup Is Now Ended

TOKYO, March 4—(A.P.)—Authoritative quarters said that Japanese army units under orders to proceed to Shanghai but still in Japan, probably would have their orders cancelled today.

Other units already on board transports on the way to Shanghai are expected to be allowed to continue their voyage, probably to relieve the soldiers who bore the brunt of the recent fighting.

After receiving reports that the fighting at Shanghai was ended, government officials here declared all Japanese troops would be withdrawn inside the twelve and one-half mile zone around the city as quickly as possible.

Some units of the Japanese, especially the eleventh division which moved across country from the southern bank of the Yangtze, have taken up positions outside the zone, official reports said.

Hope was expressed in government circles that it might be necessary to occupy the border of the zone only a few days. Whenever the Japanese command was satisfied the Chinese did not plan to renew hostilities all troops would be withdrawn to the east of a line connecting Shanghai and Woosung, it was said.

Information to the government here indicated the Chinese still had 30,000 to 40,000 men. There was conjecture about whether Gen. Chiang Kai-Shek, former president of China, would make use of the opportunity to disarm the defeated 19th route army, which hails from Canton. General Chiang has been identified with the Nanking government.

"The Shanghai mess has ended," a government spokesman said. "It is now unnecessary to arrange a truce."

The cabinet yielded to the insistence of the privy council that a special session of the diet be summoned to authorize a bond issue which will cover the expenses of the Shanghai campaign. The session will start March 18.

Lindberghs Get Promising Clue

HOPEWELL, N. J., March 4.—A promising clue to the kidnapers of the infant Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr., developed early today from the disclosure that a third ransom letter in handwriting similar to the first, had been received by the anxious father.

Its contents were kept a guarded secret.

Will Book No Customs Interference

SHANGHAI, March 4—(A.P.)—T. V. Soong, Finance Minister of the Chinese National Government and head of the so-called "Soong Dynasty," said today the Government intends to launch an expedition to suppress the new Manchurian federated state.

"Categorical instructions have been given the chief of customs," Mr. Soong said, "not to allow any interference in the collection or remittance of customs revenues in Manchuria."

Murray Harbor

Old Property To Be Expropriated

MONTREAL, Que., March 4.—(By the Canadian Press)—A colorful bit of Montreal's nineteenth century history has been unearthed in connection with the recent expropriation by the federal authorities of the 80-year old property on Cathedral Street, between St. Antoine and St. James streets near Bonaventure station.

It is a two-story brick structure fronting on St. James. On the ground floor is a restaurant and stores, and high above is the sign, "Albion Hotel." It has been a hospice, a kindergarten and a billeting place for garrison soldiers in its day.

According to E. Z. Massicotte, archivist of the district of Montreal, records kept at the City Hall show that, in 1851, this building was put up by a wealthy Montreal merchant, Hon. Antoine Olivier Berthelet and later donated as a shelter for old and young.

For 50 years the structure was operated as a hospice by the Grey Nuns. Then in 1903 it was used as a Kindergarten by the same order. In 1923 when Montreal was visited by the worst blizzard in its history many homeless were given shelter in the new building.
