BRITISH MAIL. The next Canadian steamer carrying a full mail for the United Kingdom and Overseas will sail from Quebec on the afternoon of the 26th inst. The mail will in the mean time be forwarded via New York, but papers and parcels going via the Canadian route can be mailed at any time up to and including Friday, the 24th. But it would be advisable to mail all papers a few days before that date. There will also be a mail steamer leaving St. John, N. B., on Saturday, December 2nd, but to ensure parcels being delivered for Christmas we would recommend that they should go forward by first steamer.

Farewell Service To The Rev. A. J. MacNeill, B. A.

On Monday evening, Oct. 30, the people of Murray Harbor South Presbyterian congregation gathered in the church at Murray Harbor to say Good Bye to the Rev. A. J. MacNeill, and a half year had been his pastor.

The meeting, which took the form of a religious service, was presided over by the Rev. A. Sutherland of Murray Harbor North, and was opened with singing and prayer. After a few preliminary remarks, the chairman called upon each of the members of the congregation who were present, and each in turn referred to the regret with which each section of the congregation had come to realize that Mr. MacNeill and family were soon to depart from them to take up work in Doaktown, N. B.

Mr. Sutherland, while taking the programme made reference to the warm place held by MacNeill in the hearts of the different members of the Presbytery and others outside of the congregation in which he had so successfully ministered. Mr. D. A. Horton read an address to Mr. MacNeill, and presented him with a well-filled purse from the three sections of the congregation. Mrs. Horton read a most interesting address to Mrs. MacNeill, referring to the part she had so well taken in the work of the congregation among the ladies, and presented her with a beautiful leather handbag as a remembrance from the Local Union of the Woman's Missionary Auxiliaries.

On behalf of the Murray Harbor church choir, Miss McLeod presented Mrs. MacNeill with a handsome brooch, and at the same time on behalf of the Sunday School presented Miss Jennie MacNeill with a very pretty pair of gloves. Although Mr. MacNeill and family knew absolutely nothing about the calling of this meeting until about an hour before it was held, the Reverend gentleman's address of thanks on behalf of Mrs. MacNeill, Miss Jennie and himself was most eloquent in expressing the deep attachment which he and his family felt to the Murray Harbor South congregation in all its parts. It was not without feeling of some regret that they were severing their connection with this people; but he assured all present, that although the pastoral tie was being broken, there was a bond of friendship and affection, welded by the close association of years, which time could never break. He thanked the people for all their expressions of kindness, love and sympathy, and he spoke for his successor, a place in their hearts as large and as warm as that which he had held through all these years.

After the singing of another hymn and the reading of the benediction many of those present took occasion to say farewell to Mr. MacNeill and family.

On the Sabbath following Mr. MacNeill preached his farewell sermon in the three sections of the field. At the evening service at Murray Harbor the church was packed. Rev. H. A. Brown of the Methodist Church, called his services at White Sands for that evening, and with many of his people, attended the services in the Presbyterian Church, thus show-





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
