MR. WILLIAM W. MACDONALD

Mr. William W. Macdonald, a native of Prince Edward Island, came to his death in Boston on Saturday evening last, when he was struck by a subway car.

Mr. Macdonald was born in Georgetown, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Macdonald, nee Elizabeth Gordon of New Perth, a descendant of the Scottish pioneers of Three Rivers.

His father at one time was Superintendent of Public Works for Kings County under the Provincial Government.

When a young man, Mr. Macdonald went to the United States where he followed the profession of an architect for many years, residing the greater part of the time in New York.

He spent many summers in his native province since he first left it, and was planning to come to Georgetown the first of July to rest and recuperate after a recent illness, when he met with the fatal accident, the news of which will be learned with deep regret by his numerous friends.

Quality Hay

(Experimental Farm News)

The quality of the hay fed to live stock is of prime importance, for on this factor depends largely the amount of supplementary feeds to be bought. The quality of hay, providing that it has been stored in good condition, is dependent mostly upon its content of protein and crude fibre which in turn is governed largely by the time the hay is cut.

Experiments conducted at the Dominion Experimental Station at Fredericton, with various species of grasses and legumes cut at different stages have shown that the best point of cutting is, for Kentucky Blue Grass, Red Top and Brown Top were cut at intervals ranging from every ten to every one hundred and twenty days. In all cases there was a rapid decrease in the percentage of protein as the interval between cuttings was increased. The reverse was true of crude fibre. Thus, as far as quality goes, the earlier the cutting, the better the quality. We must nevertheless, consider the period of cutting where we can receive the maximum quality without sacrificing too much yield. This period, for the grasses under tests at Fredericton, seems to be about fifty days from the beginning of active growth. Maximum yields were secured at this stage with no serious loss in protein or increase in fibre. The length of this period no doubt varies from year to year, but would correspond roughly to the period just before
