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Kramer In Tennis Singles Finals

LONDON, July 2 — (AP) — Jack Kramer, top-seeded favorite from Los Angeles, bounced the last Australian hope out of the Wimbledon tennis championships today and lined up against Tom Brown of San Francisco in an all-American battle for the men's singles title in Friday's finale.

Kramer whipped Australian Denny Pails, 6-1, 3-6, 6-1, 6-0, after Brown had backhanded Budge Patty of Los Angeles, the tournament giant-killer, 6-3, 6-3, 6-3, in semi-finals duels lasting less than an hour.

See National League Chances For All Star Game Brighter

NEW YORK, July 2 — (AP) — Bobby Feller's doubtful status in Tuesday's all-star game at Wrigley Field, Chicago, has swung added support to the oft-beaten National Leaguers who have bowed to their American League rivals in nine of 13 previous meetings.

Close to 2,000,000 fans and managers Joe Cronin and Eddie Dyer have named strong 25-man squads, but Feller still is the No. 1 pitcher in baseball, a fire-balling right-hander whose all-star game record includes one pastrty run and five stingy nits in 11 2-3 innings.

Both managers have followed closely the dictates of the fans. Although they had to start the fans' choice for each position, except pitcher, they were on their own in naming the rest of the squads. In nearly every case, Dyer and Cronin have picked men who ranked second in the poll.

Ewell Blackwell of Cincinnati, who is expected to start for Dyer's National Leaguers, will attract most attention because, like Ted Williams a year ago, he has been the most talked-about player this season.

Back of Blackwell, Dyer will have Harry (The Cat) Brecheen, who did a job on the American League champs for the Cards.

If Feller definitely is out, Cronin will be permitted to name a sub but even so, he has a capable mound array in New York's Spud Chandler, Frank Shra, and Joe Page, Detroit's Hal Newhouse, and Dixie Trout, Washington's Walt Masterson and St. Louis' Jack Kramer.

Newhouse is the probable alternate starter although neither Dyer nor Cronin will make a definite choice until Monday in Chicago.

With The Kids — On The Playground

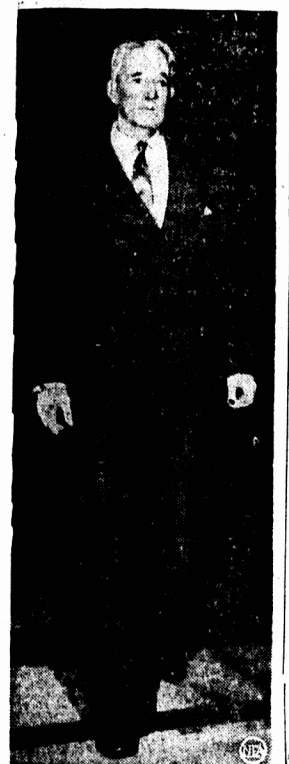

The Athletics blasted three Red Sox pitchers for 16 hits for a 7-6 American League victory last night before a packed 32,809 crowd at Boston.

Four of the Boston tallies resulted from homers by Ted Williams (No. 14), Bobby Doerr and Birdie Tettibts. Pete Suder hit for the circuit for the A's second run, and they scored the clincher in the ninth when Sam Chapman singled in Barney McCoskey.

Right-hander Alie Reynolds pitched a five-hitter and Joe DiMaggio hit his 10th home run as New York Yankees defeated Washington Senators 8-1.

The victory, coupled with Boston's loss to Philadelphia, increased the New Yorkers' first place lead in the American League to 6 1/2 games.

Home runs by Jeff Heath and Walt Judnich helped St. Louis Browns to a 7-1 victory over Chicago White Sox with hurler Jack

Kramer scattering eight hits and five walks.

Thrilling a late rally, Detroit Tigers' ace southpaw Hal Newhouse edged Cleveland Indians 6-5 for his ninth victory of the season before a "Mad Harder" night crowd of 36,350 Cleveland fans.

Detroit's Eddie Lake rapped his sixth homer to spark the Tigers' four-run first inning.

The win boosted Detroit into a second-place tie with Boston.

Feller Out With Back Injury
CLEVELAND, July 2 — (AP) — Sideline indefinitely by a back injury, Bob Feller tonight was a doubtful starter in the all-star game at Chicago next Tuesday.

The Cleveland fireballer, who was forced to quit in the second inning of Tuesday night's game at St. Louis, learned today he had torn a few fibers in his lower muscles of his back. X-ray pictures showed no other injuries.

Dr. Edward Castle, who examined the pitching ace, said: "I don't know how long the injury will be painful, but it will be several days before we can determine how soon Feller will be able to pitch again."

Tribe manager Lou Boudreau earlier said he believed Feller would not be ready to resume pitching duty until July 10 — two days after the All-Star game.

May Convert Frigate For Weather Ship

HALIFAX, July 3 — (Thursday) — (CP) — The Halifax Herald said in a newspaper story today that it had learned that the Federal Government "has under consideration" plans to convert the frigate St. Stephen, now in the reserve fleet here, for use as a North Atlantic weather ship and ice patrol vessel.

Functions of the ship would include taking and disseminating hydrographic and weather data, providing mid-ocean navigational aids to both air and surface ships, providing communication facilities and check points, maintaining an effective listening post for distress messages, rescue of personnel and conducting scientific investigations as directed.

Under the international civil aviation organization agreement 14 vessels are to be stationed in the North Atlantic. Stations A, C, D, E, F, G and H are to be operated by the U.S., station B by Canada and the U. S. jointly, stations I and J by Britain, station K by the Netherlands and Belgium jointly, station L by France and station M by Norway.

All vessels are to be on station July 1, 1948, and the Herald said that it was because of this deadline that the Government had decided to convert the frigate rather than build a new vessel, which would take "possibly two years."

Brooklyn Dodgers Take Over First Place In National League Race

Brooklyn Dodgers went into first place in the National League pennant race last night by defeating New York Giants 11-3 at Ebbets Field as Boston Braves dropped a 6-5 decision to the Phillies in Philadelphia.

Scoring nine runs in a furious fourth inning, the highest scoring inning in the National League this season, Dodgers defeated Giants as Ralph Branca struck out 10 batters in gaining his 11th victory.

Philadelphia struck from behind with four runs in the eighth inning and then scored on a passed ball in the ninth inning to defeat Boston.

Scoring eight runs in a wild fifth inning, Cincinnati Reds defeated Pittsburgh Pirates 8-6 in the other game played.

A crowd of 23,384 watched five Pirate hurlers make a futile attempt to stop the Reds.

Chicago and St. Louis had an off night.

See French Unrest Caused By Controls

PARIS, July 2 — (CP) — Much of the unrest in France today appears to stem from the resentment of a highly individualistic race against a regime of strict Government controls.

France is divided and sub-divided in her political and economic theories, but recent visits to her three largest cities and widely-separated rural sections indicate a comparative unanimity in opposition to Government intervention in daily life.

In avowed Communists and Socialists this opposition sometimes takes the form of criticizing the Government for its failure to apply a policy of rigid price and wage control more drastically. But the average man—the farmer, office clerk, small merchant and business man and workers—simply expresses himself as being fed up with controls.

Wily Paul Ramadier, premier and master of many political tricks, shows signs of bowing to the gale and raising wage ceilings. His arguments will be heard and discussed this week and will be put to a vote of confidence.

However the respect which Ramadier held a month ago largely has vanished during the recent weeks of widespread strikes, met in many cases by concessions regarded either as weak-kneed or inadequate, continued rise in prices and a flourishing condition in the black market.

While millions of Frenchmen would like to see Ramadier go, those on the left are fearful that a vacuum might develop into which the forces of the right might rush in. In this respect they think of Gen. De Gaulle.

Conversely the more conservative citizens fear the Communists might fill the breach. Communism would mean a more intensified direction of daily affairs and might antagonize the United States on whose future aid so many Frenchmen are counting.

Many of the early residents of Baltimore were Acadians banished from Nova Scotia.
