NEW BLOOD NEEDED IN SUNDAY SCHOOLS

NOTE OF WARNING SOUNDED AT THE PRESBYTERIAN ASSEMBLY MEETING.

400 MISSION VACANT.

DR. MCGILLIVRAY, CONVENER OF S. S. BOARD RESIGNS AFTER TEN YEARS.

MONTREAL.—A warning that the Presbyterian Church was not dealing adequately with the question of recruiting young people for the Sunday schools was issued at this morning's meeting of the General Assembly in Eskine Church by Rev. Dr. McGillivray, Toronto.

Dr. McGillivray pointed out that shortage of funds had caused 400 mission stations to be unoccupied during the year. Shortening their lines, the doctor argued, was not good strategy.

To show how much money could be contributed to other matters, sport, for example, the doctor pointed out that at the Woodbine race-track in Toronto it was estimated 50,000 paid \$1.50 each in the course of a week for admission, while \$1,000,000 changed hands as a result of the gambling.

This money was staked on the result of a horse-race while they were dealing with souls.

Sunday School Report.

The report of Sunday Schools and Young People's Societies Board showed that receipts of these branches of the Church work were the largest in their history, though still far below what was required to do all the work.

The number of Sabbath School enrolments showed an increase of six thousand, the total being 268,013. Enlistments caused a falling-off of four thousand in the membership of the Young People's Organization.

Rev. W. J. Knox, London, Ont., who also spoke at the Sunday School Board's report, said in Montreal they saw the omnipresent, imposing works of the Roman Catholic Church. An essential and wise part of that Church's methods was the careful conserving of its children for the Church.

He urged ministers to be seized with the importance of this fundamental work and thus fit themselves to impress the young men and women with the essay for acting as teachers. Over

fifty per cent. of their children did not become members of the Church.

Board's Recommendations.

The assembly accepted recommendations from the Sunday School Board urging:

First.—Strong Presbytery leadership in the promotion of Christian education; second, the selection of specially qualified men as convenors of committees; third, that Presbyteries arrange a conference with one of the board to explain the new training course for leaders in this work; fourth that three women be appointed to the board, a new feature for it, but an innovation, and fifth, that the Church work in the closest co-operation with all other denominations and associations engaged in this work, though retaining direct supervision of its own Christian education.

After the business in connection with the Sunday School Board had been disposed of, Rev. Dr. McGillivray, its convener for ten years, announced his resignation.

The Moderator accepted the resignation with regret.

At this afternoon's sederunt of the assembly resolutions congratulating Sir Robert Borden on the prohibition of race-track gambling after the war, and expressing gratification at the spread of prohibition legislation in Canada were adopted. The Federal Government was called upon to prohibit the manufacture of alcoholic liquor in Canada.

Sabbath Desecration.

Rev. Dr. J. G. Shearer moved a resolution deprecating Sabbath desecration, even in the guise of "alleged necessities" of war and the calm of Patriotism, which was carried, but not without a protest from Rev. Hugh McKellar, Calgary, Alta., because the transportation arrangements for the commissioners from the West were such that it was almost impossible to reach the General Assembly on time without travelling on Sunday.

"When we break it ourselves," he said, "it is no use to urge observance on the Sabbath on others."

Rev. Dr. Somerville explained that it has been understood that ministers and elders from the West could arrange to stop off over Sunday on their way east.

The report of the eastern section of the home missions stated that, as in the western section, the work was suffering because many men had enlisted. Of sixty-five men working two years ago, twenty-seven had gone to the war. It was mentioned, incidentally, as Mr. James Ross, superintendent, arose to speak, that he had four sons at the front, and this was greeted with applause.

tee. It indicated what has been done to get records from all parts of the Dominion on the work of the past and present, including a copy of a representative sermon by each minister yearly, so as to have a record of the quantity of the preaching in each year. Much valuable historical material is being collected and data of a kind to show something of the inner life of the times. The report was accepted, and the treasurer was authorized to advance \$300 to enable the work to be carried on for the next year.

In connection with the report of the Committee on Church Praise, Dr. W. J. Dey explained why the cost of hymn books had advanced, and announced that the new hymn book would be out next January. Rev. Dr. Sedgwick voiced the majority opinion by suggesting that, in view of the high cost of living, the whole matter be left over until the war is at an end, as with the introduction of new hymn books every Protestant family in Canada would have to buy one, and general applause followed his suggestion, which will be acted upon.

Will Provated The will of the late John Richards has been probated. He left an estate valued at \$189,494, made up as follows: Real Estate . . . . . \$13,100; Mortgages . . . . . 2,975; Cash in Bank . . . . . 12,557; Bank Stock . . . . . 57,248; Promissory Notes . . . . . 5,400; Furniture . . . . . 250; Stocks, shares etc. . . . . 34,930; Bonds . . . . . 56,595; Live Stock . . . . . 6,386; Farm implements . . . . . 243

He bequeaths \$500 to Edith Green a daughter of Charles Green, late of Summerside, \$3,700 for religious, educational and charitable purposes, and the rest of the estate amounting to \$185,294 to his widow Isabel Richards. The religious bequests include \$600 to St. John's Episcopal Church at Bellisle. The interest on this to go towards maintaining the church grounds, and other purposes.

The interest of \$1,200 is to be devoted towards an agricultural scholarship to be won by competitive examination at the Prince of Wales College, the scholarship to be held in any college in the Maritime Provinces, the winner to be a native of the Island. He also bequeaths \$1,200 to the Prince County Hospital as an endowment fund and \$500 for prizes for the best and most tastefully kept school grounds in Lots 11, 12 and 13.

Se also bequeaths \$200 to the Episcopal Church at Port Hill for keeping the Richards family plot in the cemetery in repair. Mr. Justice Hazard and widow of the deceased are the executors and executor respectively of the will.

Real estate includes a 170 acre farm at Bideford valued at \$7000, the Finn farm in Lot 11, \$800, Ellis farm at Bideford, \$800, Houses and land in Summerside, \$4,000, shooting grounds, Hog Island, \$500.

The cash is deposited in the following banks, Nova Scotia, \$6,911, Royal Bank, \$4,381, Montreal, \$1,250.

The Bank stocks comprise 64 shares Royal \$11,448.20 of Molson's \$3,660, 33 of Montreal \$11,560, 120 Nova Scotia \$30,480.

The stocks cover 26 different companies including Nova Scotia Steel, Canada Cement, Toronto Street Railway, Ogilvie's Flour Mills, Dominion Iron and Steel, Eastern Car Co., C. P. R. and a number of local companies.

The Bonds include \$24,000 Dominion War Loan and amounts ranging from \$100 to \$1,000 in Eastern Car, in Lachine Rapids, City of Charlottetown, time under the provincial suffrage.

LIENT. ROGERS RHODES SCHOLAR FOR ACADIA.

WOLFVILLE, N. S.— Announcement has just been made of the appointment of a Rhodes scholar by Acadia University. The recipient of the honor is Lieut. Norman McLeod Rogers, son of H. Whyoff and Mrs. Grace Dean McLeod Rogers of Amherst. Lieut. Rogers was a student at Acadia University but enlisted from there in February, 1916, with the 6th Canadian Mounted Rifles, and spent 18 months in England and France. He was recalled to take a commission, but after fitting himself for this, he was found medically unfit for overseas service, and his discharge was recommended. While at Acadia he was a leading student, a good athlete and represented the college on the debating team.

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
