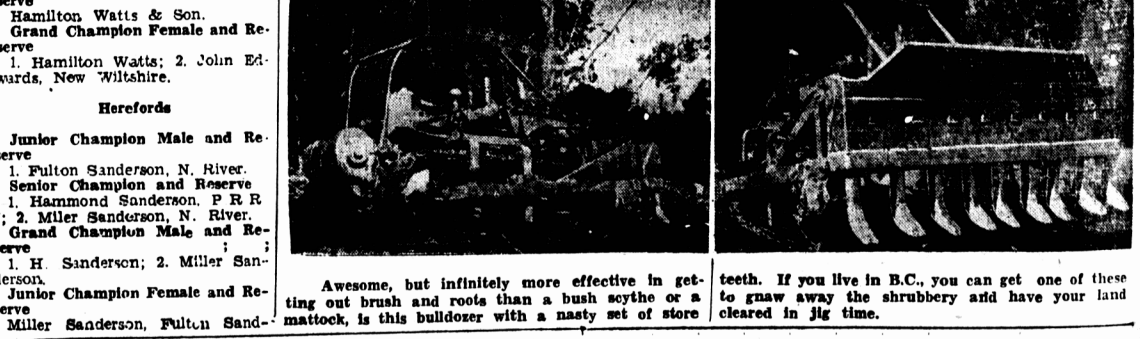

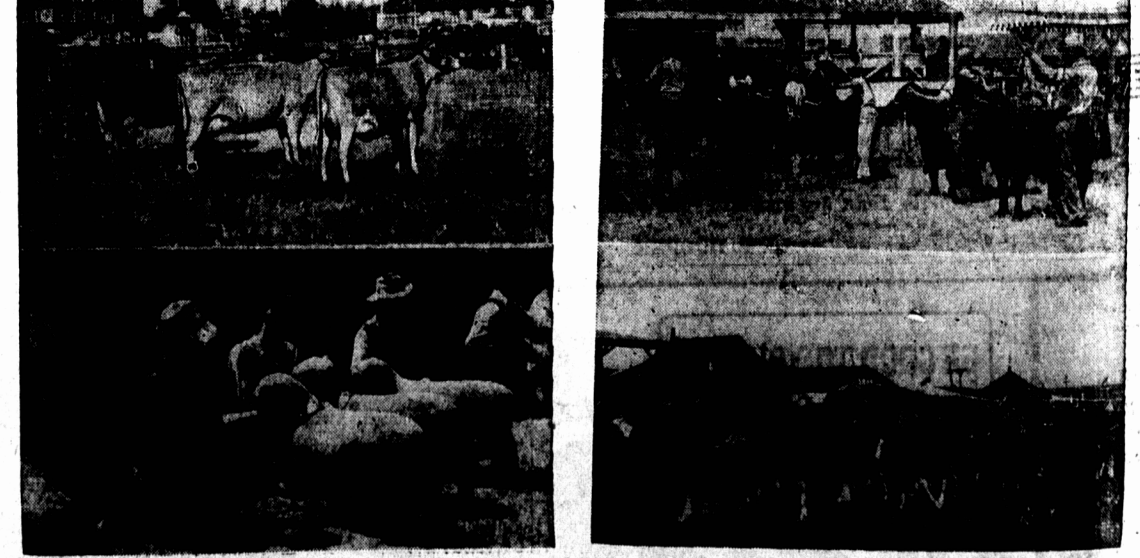
the talents of a Dix. But his portrayal never once falters in drawing a definite line of demarcation.
