**IT WAS NOT HOG CHOLERA WHICH ALARMED UNION ROAD**

Prompt Investigation by Dr. Pethick Relieves the Local Alarm—Something About the Ravages of Swine Plague in Other Lands—A Most Infectious and Fatal Malady to be Guarded Against.

It may now be mentioned that the loss of hogs from what was supposed and feared might be hog cholera as mentioned in The Guardian a few days ago, occurred on the farm of Wallace Mallet, Union Road. It turns out as the result of prompt investigation by Dr. Pethick that the disease was not hog cholera, and the fears of Mr. Mallet and his neighbors are thus allayed.

The first intimation that Dr. Pethick had of the trouble was from reading The Guardian at his home in Central Bed-que about 3 o'clock in the afternoon of Wednesday the 29th. He at once saw the importance of an early investigation, took the first train to the City and yesterday morning drove out to Mr. Mallet's farm on Union Road. He found Mr. Mallet most ready to give every information and to take any and every precaution to prevent the spread of the disease should it prove to be of an infectious or dangerous character. He had, in fact already taken the best precaution in his power by burning the bodies of the four dead hogs. This precaution however, prevented the veterinary from making any examination of the bodies, by which he might otherwise have determined the precise nature of the disease from which they died. From an examination of the two remaining hogs, which are apparently on the way to recovery and from other reasons, Dr. Pethick was satisfied that the disease is not hog cholera. More probably it may be a form of acute indigestion resulting from over-feeding. The symptoms do not accord in all particulars with hog cholera, which is remarkably infectious, the germs being readily carried in the clothes of the attendants, and as some of the neighbors had seen Mr. Mallet's pigs it is thought the disease would have already spread to other herds had it been what it was feared to be.

Hog cholera, also called "swine fever" and "swine plague," is a very deadly disease in which the lungs, serous membranes and intestines are specially infected. It is usually fatal in 75 to 95 cases out of 100 according to the virulence of the attack. It appeared in England in 1878, and in various years down to 1883 from 27,000 to 40,000 died of its ravages. During the same period it raged in Germany and Austria. The disease made its appearance in America about 40 years ago. During 1884 and 1885 in Nebraska 400,000 pigs died in each of the two years, being a quarter of the number owned in the state. The total loss in the United States from this cause in 1885 was estimated at \$30,000,000. In Missouri 200,000 pigs died; in Indiana 400,000 (one fifth of the entire number). In Ontario from time to time the loss has been very heavy and a recent outbreak there has been mentioned in the press. Very severe measures have been adopted to stamp it out. Being found almost impossible to disinfect a piggery in which the cholera had once appeared, resort was had in many cases to burial.

**WITH MILITARY HONORS.**

OTTAWA, October 28.—A telegram was received at the militia department this afternoon, stating that a staff sergeant of the imperial forces had died on the train en route from Halifax. Permission was asked to inter him with military honors. It was promptly granted.

**DREDGING AT QUEBEC.**

OTTAWA, October 28. Last season a sum was voted for dredging at Quebec. A few months ago tenders were called for \$900,000 worth of work. It is said that for the present the work will not be proceeded with.
