Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Unit—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Unit—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 30 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$10.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years; cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$200. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

GRIT CHARGE REFUTED BY GREAT BRITAIN.

Imperial Government Approves of Arrangements Made at Ottawa for Shipment of Nickel.

OTTAWA, Nov. 29.—That Canadian nickel has been falling into enemy hands has been charged recently by N. W. Rowell, leader of the Liberal party in Ontario; Hartley Dewart, K. C., and others.

The prohibition of the export of Canadian nickel matter to the United States has been urged and in this connection Sir Robert Borden today received the following cable from the British government: "It is a fact that His Majesty's government have approved from the first of the arrangements made by your government for refined nickel to American plants, it is recognized by His Majesty's government that it would be impossible and indeed manifestly injurious in the conduct of the war to prohibit the export of Canadian nickel matter, and they have concurred in the method of supervising now being adopted which seems to them to be the best practical method."

Mertons have eliminated the enemy holding in the company with the approval of the Board of Trade. His Majesty's government therefore utilized the services of this company which have assisted in securing government control of metals. Such control could hardly have been secured without this help.

The Mertons alluded to in the cable is the firm of Henry Merton and Son, London, to which company recent reference has been made in public utterances by Mr. Rowell and Mr. Hartley Dewart.

GERMAN SOCIALISTS PROTEST AGAINST BELGIAN DEPORTATIONS

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
AMSTERDAM, via London, Dec. 4.—In the course of a debate on the bill in the Reichstag embodying a Socialist proposal that a permanent workmen's committee should be appointed in connection with industrial workshops and railways which was defeated by one vote, the Socialists condemned the action of the government in deporting Belgian workers. Thousands of workers in occupied regions already have been subjected to compulsory labor.

Deputy Haase is reported to have said: "We summon the government to restore freedom, especially to Belgian workmen."

Deputy Haase said that neutral governments of the Board of Trade, the Belgians under the provisions of the bill and he condemned the deportations as a violation of international law. Deputy Wilhelm Tittman, another Socialist, discussing the situation, is reported to have said: "When the Belgian workers returned from Holland to Belgium Government-General Von Bissing assured those returning that under no circumstances would they be deported to Germany. This assurance has not been kept."

Dr. Helfferich in replying, declared that he deplored deeply that the discussion should have arisen "thereby promoting the business of our enemies."

Turning to Deputy Haase, the deputches say, the vice-chancellor said: "The setting of unemployed Belgians to work is thoroughly consistent with international law. They are not given work, which, owing to international law, they should not perform. We are only making use of our undoubted rights."

HOUSES RAZED DELIBERATELY BY THE GERMANS

Armies of invasion came supplied with Germans to set Belgian Houses on Fire.

Many people have the idea that the property damage in Belgium has largely been the result of artillery fire and other military operations connected with the war.

A report just completed by Commission of the Belgian Government shows that this is not the case, but that a very large proportion of the property destroyed was purposely destroyed, without any provocation whatever.

Innumerable witnesses who have been examined have testified to the fact that the Germans appeared, one of their first acts, next to the wholesale shooting of the inhabitants, was to spread fire and destroy property.

For this purpose they brought with them bombs and grenades for throwing into the interior of houses and setting them on fire.

This wholesale destruction and its consequences are pictured in a notebook of a German officer who fell on the battlefield. He wrote of the scenes of invasion of one district—"Blivouac! Rain! Burnt Villages! The consequences of war—houses burnt, women and children crying, the execution of the times. Innocent people are shot because there is no time for inquiry."

This deliberate destruction of property and breadwinners is what has made the Belgian people so frightfully destitute. If the Germans had only left the people their houses and left them to work out an existence on such products as they could raise while the country was under occupation their condition would not be so bad. But in many places they have pillaged and destroyed everything, and the people are reduced to beggars.
