THE POTATO MARKET.—The following references to the potato market in St. John and elsewhere will be of general interest in this Province. Potatoes are still going up, to use a market phrase. In Boston sales are being made by retail markets and grocery stores at 50 cents a peck or at about \$5 a barrel. The restaurants and hotels in Boston are planning to make an extra charge for potatoes. In St. John the wholesale prices range from \$2.50 to \$3 a barrel, according to quality. At retail they are selling here at from \$3. to \$3.50 a barrel in small quantities. There is every indication of a further rise in this city. Woodstock quotes potatoes at \$2.75 a barrel at first hands. In Westmorland and Kent counties potatoes are scarce and many of them are of inferior quality. At Shediac the prevailing prices are \$1.50 and upwards. Prices in Cuba are still advancing.

THE PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.—The steamer did not leave Pictou until 7.15 yesterday morning and docked here about 12 noon with 35 passengers and seven cars of freight. Much heavy ice was encountered on the way over, the St. Lawrence being passed Point Prim in heavy ice, moving slowly. In some places the ice was rafted to a depth of six feet.

105TH REGIMENT.—The following young men have joined the 105th Highland Brigade: E. Youland, Covehead; Ernest Jenkins, City; Earl Jenkins, Dundas; John McDonald, Dundas; Walter Crockett, New Glasgow; Edward A. Matheson, Dundas. The strength of the 105th is now 780 officers and men. This does not include about sixty volunteers who have signified their intention of coming in, but have not yet reported for duty, making the strength on hand about 850. Private M. K. Charman of "B" Company has been promoted to Sergeant. Sergt. Charman is one of the Mount Allison students who enlisted in the 105th Battalion.

WANTS DIVORCE.—A St. John exchange says, Mrs. Mary Askin, of Litchfield, Boston, wife of William H. Askin, a master mason, formerly of Prince Edward Island, is a petitioner in the Probate Court at Boston for separate support from her husband. Mrs. Askin claims that her husband refused to allow her more than six inches of their bed, that she was forced to sleep on her side and that she has been treated so cruelly in other ways that she became desperate in taking a dose of poison. 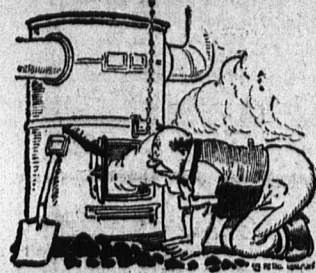
