Abegweit were again beaten by Crystals last night. The Western sextet playing the same cage hockey as that exhibited in Charlottetown last Friday night, took their home set-to 2 to nil. It looks as if the locals are in for a thorough shaking up before the schedule goes much further.

Amending the rule regarding players stopping the puck with their hands should eliminate a lot of useless penalties in the N. H. L. It was placed in the rule book when the rules were being overhauled and the moguls were in a state of reform.

Many players formerly would grab the puck and hurl it forward, giving them a big advantage. The old rule was inserted to stop that, but it went too far, and if the rubber happened to strike a player's glove even he was penalized. Now it has been changed to only apply to those who catch the puck and momentarily hold it. It is a useful revision.

Auréli Joliat of the Canadiens and "Dit" Clapper of the Bruins are the first two National League players this season to be automatically suspended for one game as a result of incurring three major penalties.

What they will do to the Ambling Alp once they get him in the army will be on a par with what he did to a number of opponents.

Late Market News

MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 6.—Egg prices were unchanged today on the local dairy market, but the heavy snowfall of the last two days is expected to bring higher quotations at the beginning of next week. Dealers point out that owing to the large stocks on hand prices have been lower than usual for some time, but the heavy snowfall will prevent additional stocks from accumulating here. The farmers being unable to bring in the produce. The butter prices were slightly stronger, carlot prices being half a cent higher at 31 1-2 cents a pound for eastern townships prime. The cheese market was steady at from 13 to 12 1-2 cents for current arrivals. Other lines were steady and unchanged. Cash grain prices followed the Winnipeg advances and were generally one cent a bushel higher.

COLLEGE FUDGE
1 cup each white and brown sugar
2 squares unsweetened chocolate
1/2 cup butter.
1/4 cup molasses.
1/2 cup cream.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
Melt butter in saucepan. Do not discolor. Mix sugar, molasses and cream and add. Boil three minutes, counting from time boiling begins; add the chocolate, grated or shaved, and boil to soft ball (236 degrees F.). Take from fire, cool and add vanilla and beat until thick. Turn into buttered tin, cool, mark in squares.
