PRODUCE

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Nov 8.—Eggs and cheese prices were stronger on the Montreal dairy and produce market today and other lines remained unchanged. Better demand for cheese caused by the rise in sterling, practically all of the cheese passing through Montreal being for export to the United Kingdom, indicated the strength in the cheese market. Ontario were generally quoted at 9 1/2 cents a pound with Quebec at 9 cents. In a few scattered cases higher prices were being offered. Receipts totalled 288 boxes. The egg market was strong on fresh eggs and steady on storage eggs. Graded Ontario fresh eggs in cartons or less were quoted mostly at 46 to 47 cents a dozen for extras, 40 cents for firsts and 37 1/2 cents for pullets. Storage eggs continued at 21 to 21 1/2 cents for extras, 19 to 19 1/2 cents for firsts and 16 to 16 1/2 cents for seconds. Offerings amounted to 104 cases. No 1 grade butter in cartons or less was firm at 20 1/2 to 21 cents a pound. Arrivals were 40 boxes. On the potato market Quebec were 60 to 70 cents per 80 pound bag with New Brunswick green mountains at 75 to 80 cents.

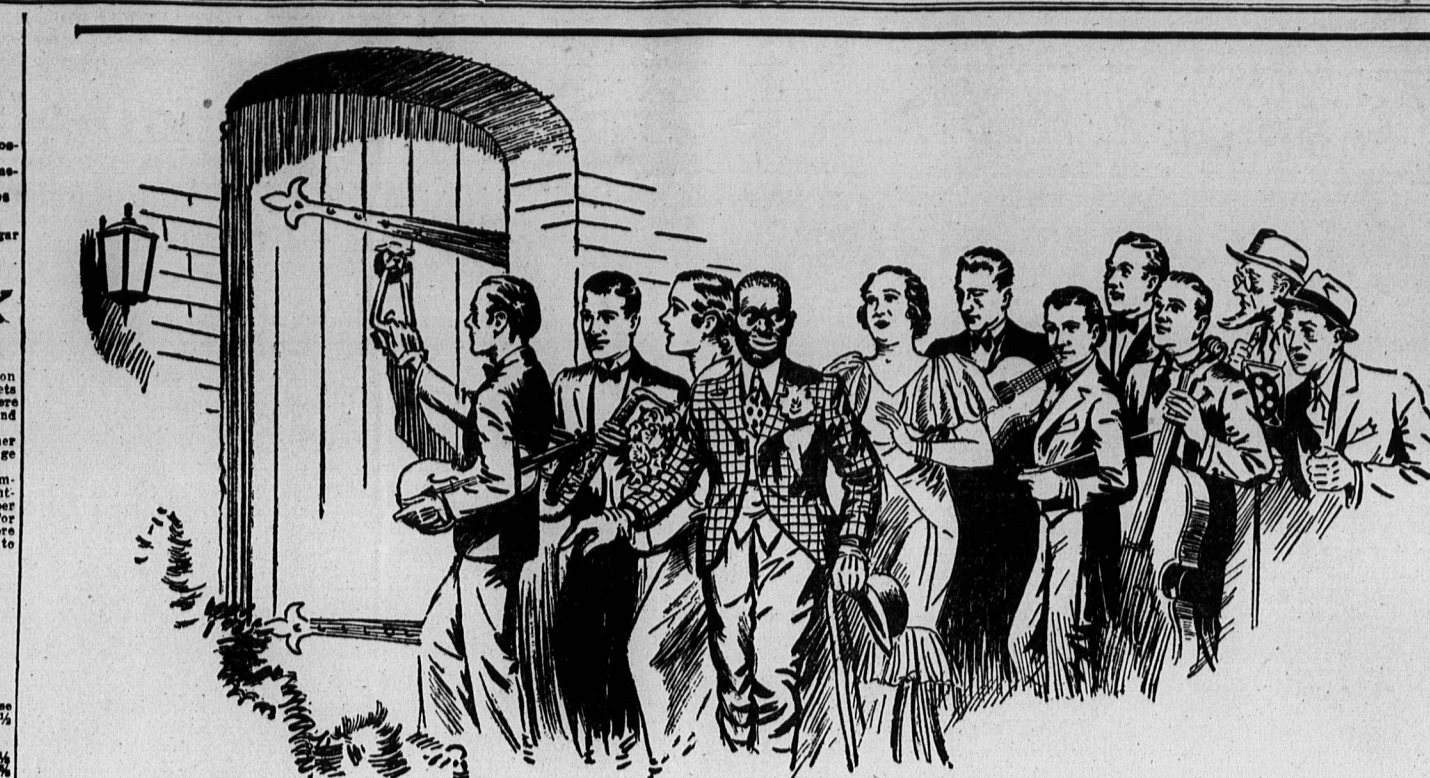

Extortion Plot Ends in Failure WINSTON-SALEM, N. C., Nov. 7.—A crudely-planned plot to extort \$10,000 from R. J. "Dick" Reynolds, Jr., Winston-Salem sportsman and heir to tobacco millions, under threat of kidnapping his pretty 25 year old wife ended today in the arrest of John Lanier, 35, an unemployed textile worker. Lanier was arrested as he picked up a dummy package left by officers at a spot where two notes, sent to Reynolds, directed the \$10,000 be placed. Mrs. Lanier was taken into custody at her home and brought to police headquarters for questioning. Officers said Lanier denied for several hours after his arrest that he wrote the notes to Reynolds and maintained that he found the package by accident, but later admitted he wrote the notes. The first of the notes was received by Reynolds on October 28 and a second was received two days later. Officers declined to reveal the text of the notes but said they directed that the money be left at a street corner here. Reynolds told officers he hoped they would be lenient with Lanier who has been in ill health. Reynolds, eldest son of the late R. J. Reynolds, founder of the tobacco company which bears his name, is the heir to approximately \$20,000,000 of his father's estate which is now held in trust. He and Mrs. Reynolds, the former Elizabeth Dillard of Winston-Salem were married last spring. HOLES IN OILCLOTH When holes begin to appear in an oilcloth that has been down for a number of years, try pouring hot paraffin into them and pressing it down evenly with a knife. It will prevent further tears, as the heels will not catch in the holes and the paraffin will show surprisingly little. PEANUTS, DESSERT FLAVOR Peanut brittle is a nice flavor for a frozen cream dessert.
