**THE COLCHESTER ELECTION.**  
The Government encountered a cold at wind on Thursday, the storm centre being located in Colchester. It blew down a portion of the Liberal fence within which since 1894 the Province had been enclosed and an Opposition man cut out at the breach and will occupy within the enclosure till the bigger storm comes next year. But Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues at Ottawa may not lay the matter very much to heart. They have still an abundant support in Parliament; they have power, patronage, a full treasury and a big surplus. The Liberal party will not take down its sign but will charge Colchester up to profit and loss and still continue business at the old stand.

To the Opposition party the victory means more than the defeat signifies to the Government. They have broken the Liberal solidarity of Nova Scotia and got a foothold in a Province where they were wholly excluded from a voice in Parliament. That is much to them. And on general grounds it is a good thing that the large body of Conservative electors in Nova Scotia shall have one of themselves holding a seat within the Province to speak for them. But this is not all. They have raised a seat by a majority of 223 which before gave 191 majority for the Liberals. An equal change in other comparatively close counties would sweep Annapolis, Hants and Cape Breton and Victoria into the Conservative column. Still, "one swallow does not make a summer," and yet on the other hand the winter is usually pretty well over before the first swallow comes in spring.

For several reasons we accept the election of Mr. Stanfield as a by no means untoward event. First of all, Mr. Stanfield is an Islander by birth, comes of good stock and is rated by those who know him as "all wool a yard wide and entirely unshrinkable". It suits our notion that though Conservative, he asserts his independence. Better still, being of Island birth, we shall feel that the Island and the Tunnel will find in him a friend and a supporter. Our own representation of the Island is so scant that we must neglect no opportunity to secure the election of Islanders to represent Mainland constituencies. We have the brainy Islanders at home and abroad capable of

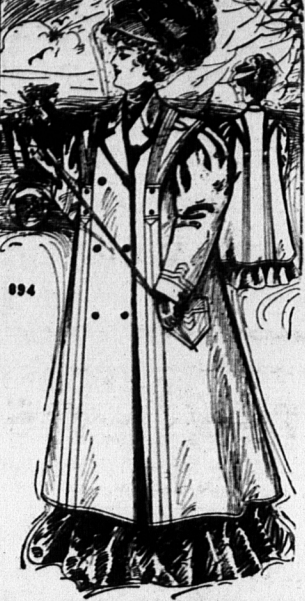
