AT the annual meeting of the C. A. A. A. held last evening the following were elected a board of Directors:—A. E. Ings, Dr. H. D. Johnson, George J. Rogers, B. C. Prowse, J. A. Farquharson, A. Alley, E. H. Beer.

PROGRESS is reported in connection with the big bicycle trust which is being formed, but the affair is one too big to permit of haste. One thing of which riders and retailers may feel assured, say the trust promoters, is that the combine will not be permitted to affect this year's prices in any way. There is said to be practically unlimited capital available for the scheme, and the latest reports place the capitalization at \$80,000,000 instead of \$50,000,000. It is said, also, that there will be no change of the principals in any concern for five years, and that the names of well-known machines will be retained and advertised the same as ever. It is understood that many men of high financial standing are interested in it, including Senator Sandford and Senator Drummond.

AT the close of the Sabbath school in Zion Church Sunday afternoon the Superintendent referred to the fact that Mr. Frederick Semple and family are leaving the city and therefore the school would sustain the loss of one of its most efficient and faithful teachers; also that Rev. A. F. Thomson, who has been for the last four weeks preaching with great acceptance to the congregation, and who had by his presence and kind counsel rendered the school much encouragement and assistance during his stay among the people, was also leaving. Mr. David Schurman moved that a vote of thanks be passed and tendered to Mr. Semple and also to Rev. Mr. Thomson for the services and kindness shown. Mr. A. B. McKenzie seconded the motion. Both mover and seconder spoke in high terms of commendation of the work done by Mr. Thomson during his short stay in Charlottetown. The motion was carried unanimously.

FOR one hour and a half in St. James' Hall last evening a large and cultured audience listened with deep interest to a lecture by Rev. T. F. Fullerton. With witty anecdote, and historic incident, enlivened by song, and illustrated by lime-light the Rev. gentleman took his hearers on a "Visit to Ireland." Among the many points of interest touched at were Dublin Bay, looked upon by the Irishman, and quite properly, as one of the finest in the world, Belfast, the western metropolis of commerce; Giant's Causeway; Ardgal Waterfall—perhaps unsurpassed in the world; the famous and beautiful Lakes of Killarney; Eagle's Nest Mt.; Sullivan's Cascade; Dunluce Castle with its picturesque ruins of turrets, walls and towers; and the city of Cork. During the season, now successfully brought to a close, Mr. Fullerton has taken interested audiences, whom he thanked for their kind patronage, through England, Scotland and Ireland. The Y. M. C. A. of St. James' Church are to be congratulated on the abundant success which has attended their efforts in the promotion and carrying out of their concert and lecture course for 1898-99.

IRISH COUNCIL ELECTIONS.

DUBLIN, April 10.—Returns received from the Irish Council elections show that 300 Nationalists, 83 Unionists, one Labor candidate and one Liberal have been returned.

The Earl of Dunraven and Mount Earle Baron Mount Eagle of Brandon, and Baron Emily, Unionist, were elected in Limerick. The results of the elections in a few places will not be known until today.

The Boys' Brigade.

A fine and enthusiastic audience greeted Rev. Mr. Withycombe in the schoolroom of the First Methodist Church last evening, much to his delight, and that his discourse was equally to their satisfaction was attested by the frequent and hearty applause. The subject was the Boys' Brigade, which the lecturer told had originated in Scotland, had been strongly endorsed by Prof. Drummond, Spurgeon and others and had spread throughout the English-speaking world. Its object is the promotion of Christ's kingdom among boys, teaching them the lessons of true manliness, self respect, chivalry, brotherhood and patriotism. There is pugnacity in all boys; it is inherited, and developed in schools. The quality is associated with courage, and when subjected to discipline and subordination is useful and commendable. Boys in the growing period had been too much neglected. It is a critical period, when habits are forming. The Brigade movement is intended to carry them over this period, developing a manly physique and a frank manly character. The officers of the Brigade needed to be strict disciplinarians, with a knowledge of military drill, a knowledge and appreciation of boy nature and the spirit of the Good Samaritan. The lecturer paid a very warm tribute to his officers in the Summerside Brigade—Messrs. Campbell, Hobkirk and Harri-son. He hoped to see the movement spread till on some Dominion Day or Queen's Birthday brigades from all the principal centres in uniform should be brought together in Charlottetown, as they were in other countries and addressed by some of our public men, inculcating lessons of patriotism.

At the beginning of his lecture Mr. Withycombe had asked the boys seated in a body near the platform to nominate one of their number to be the first to wear the Brigade uniform in Charlottetown. Master Wallace McKie was nominated and on going forward, and especially on donning the uniform and cap, was very heartily cheered.

Col. Moore presided acceptably and was complimented by the lecturer on the interest he had taken in this work. The vote of thanks was moved by Rev. Mr. Raymond and seconded by Mr. Percy Pope. It was adopted with acclamation. Mr. J. K. Davison then voiced the patriotic feeling of the meeting by singing with great vigor The Red, White and Blue. A large number, especially of the boys and young men remained to hear more of the details of the movement and take steps toward forming a Brigade here. In a short time about 70 boys were enrolled and steps were taken to form Brigades in several other of the city churches.
