Hon. J. H. Cumminsley opened the discussion. He dealt with the subsidy question and also reviewed the policy of the Public Works Department, claiming that the expenditure was in the best interests of the country.

H. J. Palmer the next speaker, dealt with the main points of the Liberal platform. Mr. Mathieson followed, dealing mainly with the subsidy, declaring that there was no record of his voting in favor of the resolution of 1902, although it was pointed out to him that the resolution passed unanimously, and the names were not, therefore taken down in the Journals.

Leonard Wood, Conservative candidate was called upon and said he would give his time to Mr. Mathieson.

The management is doing its best with what they have and solicit the support of every loyal citizen, feeling that the association as it is being conducted well merits their support.

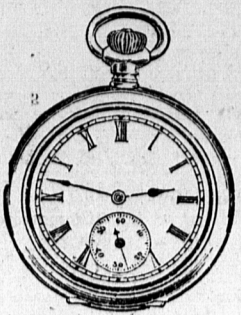
