analysis of the child's mind. The child is very susceptible to the influence of the spirit and this should be realized by the teacher; that the children may grow up continually aware of the richness of their spiritual inheritance.

It is absolutely necessary that the spiritual sense be developed. The "vision splendid" must not be allowed to fade into the light of common day.

Rev. Mr. Christie suggested in an interesting manner how this spiritual knowledge may be imparted to the child by means of ordinary school lessons and in the natural objects and common duties around him.

Can we not teach the child a finer patriotism; point out how the wealth of our mines, our forests and our fisheries can be made to serve our fellow men as they should. Even in so prosaic a subject as arithmetic the rule that "two plus two makes four" may be used as a standard of truthfulness and honesty that would be of the highest usefulness to the child through life.

If the teacher can impart spiritual vision to even two or three pupils during a meeting, the work is not in vain, and that life has indeed been worth while.

His Worship Mayor McKenna extended on behalf of the citizens of Charlottetown a cordial welcome to the visiting teachers attending the convention. He felt assured of the beneficial results of the gathering. An interesting explanation was made of the city school system, the progress made, and the manner in which school expenditure is controlled. Incidentally he mentioned that Prince Street School in which the teachers meetings were being held was the oldest public school in the city. He referred also to medical inspection in the schools and to the recently adopted pension scheme for city teachers.

Miss Rosamond Archibald, M. A., of the Ladies' Seminary, Wolfville, was given a hearty reception. Addressing the convention she spoke of her own experience upon the Prince and the pleasant impression she had received from her recent visit, she went on to review the success of her efforts in teaching better English by means of class drill and the "Better English Drive" which is giving splendid results. Miss Archibald's address was along similar lines to the eloquent appeal for better English made during her previous visit here. She referred to the success of the "Key to English" which has been printed to meet the demand of schools for her method which has now become so well known. She pointed out a great weakness in the present methods of teaching English by having the child learn the incorrect and correct forms of speech at the same time. If arithmetic was taught this way there would be as many half-mathematicians as there are ungrammatical speakers. She appealed to her fellow teachers to become the guardians and keepers of the King's English.

Hon. Dr. McMillan referred with regret to the absence of Premier Stewart, who is leaving shortly for Ottawa on important business and was unable to attend the meeting. He had been requested by the Premier to announce that a sub-committee of the Provincial Executive has been appointed to deal with the subject of education in this Province. Information is being gathered and during the course of the year this committee will make a survey of the whole question. It is proposed to introduce a new educational system with the system in vogue in other provinces, and if there are remedies to be applied, this will be done. Advice and criticism of present conditions on the part of teachers will be welcomed. The Premier requests the appointment of a committee to co-operate with the Government. If our curriculum is over-loaded, and there are many indications that this is so, then whatever subjects considered essential in our educational system will be dropped. Reference was made to the very large registration of teachers attending the

convention this year. The speaker stressed the importance of the physical condition of the pupils and the benefit of medical inspection. The Government had been asked if they were prepared to assist the Red Cross Society to enable it to carry on the medical inspection of schools and they had done so. He believed this would be appreciated by the teachers and the country at large.

Dr. McMillan referred to the deplorable exodus of young people from the island and urged that pupils be made to realize that the essence of loyalty is first of all loyalty to Prince Edward Island. We need more faith in our own Province. We should use every means we possess in order to keep our young people at home and this is a plain duty before the teachers of this Province.

Pupils are leaving school to take college matriculation examinations at too early an age. If the parents can be persuaded of this fact it will prepare the way to making much progress in the future. It is a serious question whether the Province, is getting value on the money expended on education. The speaker referred to the districts where the average school attendance was very small. It is not a fair thing to put any teacher into these schools and it was unfair to the pupils as well.

The benefits of consolidation should be impressed upon the parents of the children in these schools. It is a fact that our people are not taking kindly to it because it means travelling further to school, but the educational value is far greater. Sooner or later consolidation must come in this Province.

Hon. J. H. Myers, Commissioner of Agriculture said he was pleased to see so many young men in the teaching profession today. That is getting back to old times when the teacher was recognized as a man of standing in the community. He reminded his hearers of the fact that they had received exceptional educational advantages, having been sent to college from homes where there may have been no farms to keep. These people had missed the opportunities of wide education, and something was due them. As a farmer himself, Hon. Mr. Myers suggested to the teachers the value that would accrue to communities from the encouragement by them during the winter months of old fashioned singing schools, debating and literary societies.

The Commissioner's address closed one of the most enjoyable and instructive meetings yet held by the teachers. The convention is continuing today.

TO BROADCAST KING GEORGE'S SPEECH

(British United Press.)

LONDON, April 22.—Britain's great \$100,000,000 "empire-boasting" exhibition will be officially opened tomorrow by King George—appropriately enough on St. George's Day, the feast of England's patron saint.

For the benefit of those unable to attend the opening ceremony, King George's speech will be broadcast by wireless—the first time the British monarch has been broadcast.

Elaborate ceremonial will mark the opening, and the general public admitted at the scheduled price of one shilling and sixpence will be strictly marshalled to conform with the occasion. Wembley Park being some eight miles from Buckingham Palace, the royal party will motor the greater part of the distance, changing into state carriages drawn by four horses about a quarter of a mile from the exhibition.

The king is immensely interested in the arrangements for broadcasting for, although a wireless fan, this was the first time he has been induced to speak for "distribution"—due mainly to obsolete court etiquette, which has always required the sovereign's words to be conveyed strictly and literally by "word of mouth" (and hearing).

The royal party will also witness a section of the "Pageant of Empire," depicting the history of the British race and the growth of the empire, and make hasty tour of the exhibition.

The exhibition covers 240 acres and is the largest the world has yet seen. Every section of the kaleidoscopic British empire is included, and the British and Colonial governments have put up around ten million pounds to make it thoroughly official and representative. From first to last over 20,000,000 pounds will have been expended on construction and exhibits, and between 25,000,000 and 30,000,000 people are expected to visit the exhibition during the summer.

Oldest Building in the World

The oldest building in the world still standing above the ground has been found by the joint expedition of the British Museum, London, and the University Museum, Philadelphia at Tell el Obeld, in Babylonia, four miles from Ur of the Chaldees, of Biblical fame.

This was announced by Dr. George B. Gordon, director of the University Museum, in making a report from Dr. C. Leonard Woolley, head of the joint expedition on the banks of the Euphrates.

The excavation of this building, a temple, has brought to light marvelous carvings of animals and men, and moved the already ancient history of Babylonia back 1,000 years.

The building is more than 6,000 years old, and its history is placed at a period as far removed from King Tut-Ankh-Amen in the past as the present generation is removed from him in known history.

Dr. Gordon announced that the expedition had unearthed remarkable carvings of animals done in limestone, mosaics and even artificial flowers of stone.

One of the choicest finds was a small golden scaraboid bead, inscribed with the name of the builder of the temple, King Aa-Ni-Pad-da of Ur, who reigned 4,500 years before Christ. This is the oldest royal jewel known.—"The United Presbyterian."

Did Abraham see this old building when he was a boy?
Dr. George B. Gordon above referred to is a son of the late Captain James Gordon of New Perth and a nephew of the late Hon. David Gordon, Georgetown.

No "Gentlemen"

(By Dominion News Service)

HERLIN, April 17.—The town council of Ansbach, in Bavaria, has decided to impose a tax on all foreign words used in print, signs, and advertisements.

A barber who is a member of the council declared it would be monstrous to tax him for calling himself a "friseur" because the word is French and there is no German word to take its place. Another member wanted to know what German equivalents could be found for those words and phrases which signify fashion and aristocratic elegance to the simple German mind—such words as "high life," "5 o'clock," "gentlemen," and sport.

Nevertheless the council decided that the unfortunate persons who employ these exotic words must pay 25 cents a letter yearly up to 10 letters, and for each letter above 10, 75 cents.
