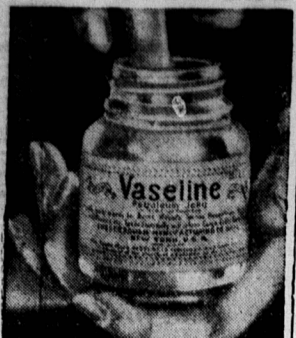

EXPORTS TO U. S. DECREASE

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 24—Exports from Canada to the United States for the first six months of 1931 were valued at \$139,604,000, a decline of \$79,802,000—or 36 percent below those for the corresponding period in 1930, according to figures issued by the Department of Trade and Commerce. United States purchases from Canada during this period amounted to 12.6 percent of total imports, a larger share than for any similar period since 1921, with the exception of last year when it was 12.7 per cent. Canada continued as the chief source of supply, followed by Japan with 8.8 percent of the total, United Kingdom 6.4, Germany 5.7 and Brazil 5.6.

TRURO HAS JAIL TROUBLES

TRURO, N. S., Oct. 24—A prisoners' paradise—a jail in which the inmates had plenty of rum as well as food, and from which they could take excursions to town almost at will—was described here to H. W. Sangster, K. C., commissioner appointed to investigate the operation of a temporary county jail by Sheriff I. O. B. McKim and jailor Charles Smith.

According to the evidence, conditions at the institution were brought before the public when the Nova Scotia police were called on July first to quell a disturbance the prisoners created in their celebration of confederation. Officers testified that they had found several of the prisoners "in a drunken condition."

A MARRIAGE MIX-UP

CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 24—Mr. and Mrs. Rudolph Beckman, parents of seven grown children, were married today—but they couldn't use the license which he obtained 25 years ago last June.

Mrs. Beckman hailed the man she supposed was her husband into Judge Joseph Graber's court today for non-support. In proof of their wedded state, she produced a marriage license, yellowed with age.

"This is only a license," Judge Graber said. "Where is your marriage certificate?"

"That's all we ever had," Mrs. Beckman replied, beginning to weep. "Isn't it legal?"

Judge Graber explained, and offered to marry them immediately. Then the question of a license came up.

Beckman wanted to use the old license and save the \$3, which was \$2.85 more than he had in his pockets. Judge Graber finally supplied the funds for a new one and married them immediately.

The couple left the court arm in arm, confident of being able to settle their difficulties and talking of "maybe we might take a little honeymoon trip in the spring."

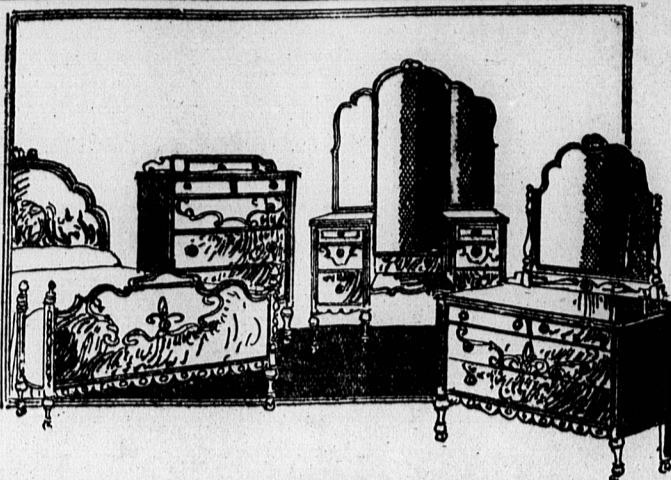

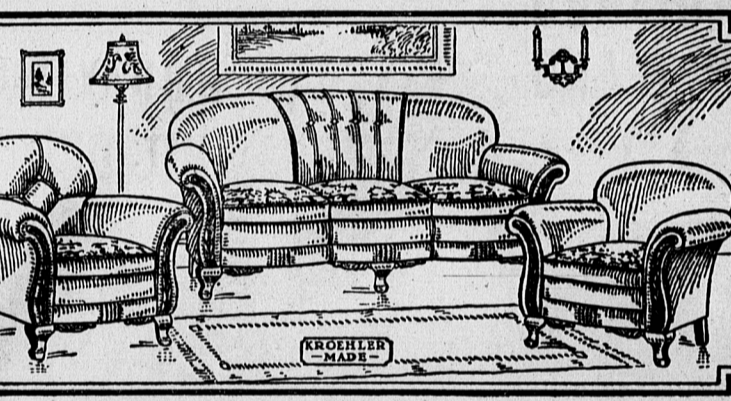
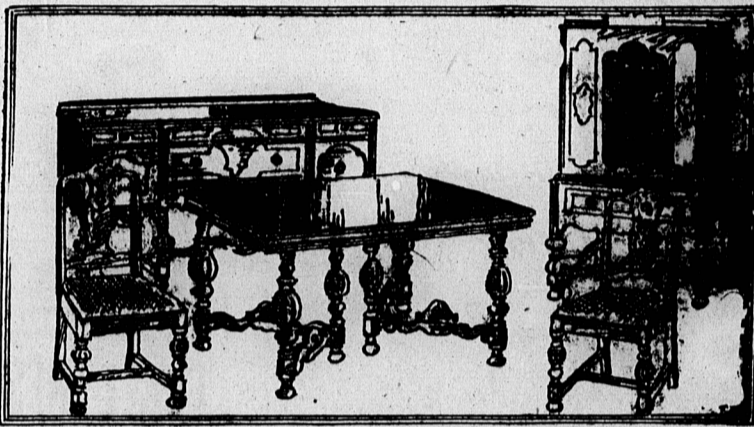

JAIL FINES MISSING—CITY TREASURY IS SHORT \$12,538, DEPUTY COMPTROLLER SAYS

VANCOUVER, Oct. 24—Of \$17,730 paid in fines at Oakalla jail from 1919 to date, \$12,538 has not reached the city treasury, Deputy Comptroller Wardhaugh announced at the opening of this morning's session of the civic enquiry into the police court clerk's department. Mr. Wardhaugh stated that since 1919 a total of 260 fines were received in Oakalla. Of these 123 with a total of \$5,192 reached the city treasury, but there is no trace of the other 137.

UNITED STATES FUNDS ARE DEPOSITED

WINDSOR, Ont., Oct. 24—According to Windsor bankers, there has been a large increase in the deposit of American money in border banks since the Canadian dollar went under par in the United States. Banks are allowing from 8 to 10 per cent premium on United States currency when placed on deposit. It is admitted that a considerable number of new accounts have been opened within the last few weeks and that several of them are for \$1,000 or more. Bankers say that the depositors plan to leave the funds in Canada until the exchange situation changes, as they find they are being paid a good interest in addition to the premium at which their funds are credited now.

FLYING SEASON FOR FLOAT AND BOAT PLANES

Topographical Survey, Department of the Interior, Issues Valuable New Map
Of interest to aviation companies and to aviators generally is a small map of Canada recently issued by the Topographical Survey of the Department of the Interior giving the average date of the start and end of the flying season for float and boat planes. With the increasing use of the plane in Canada, and particularly in the northern parts of the country, such information becomes a matter of importance. The limiting dates for half-monthly intervals are shown by a series of red and blue lines; the red lines indicating the approximate average date in spring when

the ice disappears from small waterways and small bays of large waterways, other than tidal bays, and the blue lines the approximate average date in fall when the ice appears thereon. The information used in the preparation of this map covered some 500 stations and was obtained from various sources including, in addition to the Topographical Survey itself, the Meteorological Service of Canada, the Civil Government Air Operations, the Hudson's Bay Company, the Pilots of the British Admiralty, the United States Weather Bureau, and others.
