Supreme Court

The Michaelmas Term of the Supreme Court opened yesterday in Charlottetown before the Chief Justice and associate judges. Judgment was given in a number of appeal cases, including the following:
Wm. M. Simpson and others vs John S. Cousins. Application to set aside a general verdict for the defendant entered Jan. 20, 1921 and to grant a new trial. The case was tried before the late Mr. Justice Fitzgerald and jury, the action being to recover a balance of account dealing chiefly with lobster can deliveries on the common debitatus count, amounting to about \$2,444. The three judges yesterday set aside the previous verdict and grant a new trial.
Henry Murray vs Kentford Waite, application to set aside verdict given at Trinity term, 1920 before Judge Fitzgerald and jury in case of action for debt and conversion, the verdict being then given for plaintiff for \$650. Judge Arsenault yesterday ruled that the application be refused with costs.

Wm. Distant vs J. Alfred Farquharson, breach of contract case in which through an oversight it happened that the findings on the different issues were inconsistent. The Chief Justice granted a new trial, the question of costs to be reserved.
The New England Dressed Meat & Wool Company vs Patrick Brost action for debt in connection with lamb shipments. The case was tried before Judge Hazard and jury in July 1921 and verdict given for plaintiff. The Chief Justice dismissed the application for a new trial with costs.
H. McKinnon vs A. Richard, application for new trial dismissed by Judge Hazard with costs.
Bruce Stewart & Co. Ltd vs R. H. Sterns. This case was referred to arbitration at the July term, the award to be returned this term. Mr. Gaudet for plaintiff made application to have the term of the award extended to next Hilary term, and filed consent of defendant to the application, which was granted by the Court.
Neil McKay vs Patrick Trainor, appeal from the Queen's County Court decision given for plaintiff for \$40. The appeal was dismissed yesterday with costs.

GOVERNMENT STEAMER
HERE—The Canadian Government steamer "Murray Stewart" arrived in port Saturday night from St. John, N. B. en route to Perry Sound, Ont., via Quebec. The steamer was recently purchased by the Dominion government from Nagie & Wetmore, Ltd., St. John, and is to be operated by the Department of Marine and Fisheries. The vessel is a buoy and light house tender. The ship is in command of Capt. Murdoch, McLellan, Master of the D. G. S. "Lancaster," St. John, and his chief officer Mr. Frank D. Stevens, also of the same ship. On arrival at their destination these officers will return to St. John and resume their offices on their own ship. Capt. McLean is well known in the port, having sailed on steam and sailing vessels from here. He is a native of Orford, Nova Scotia, and for the last thirteen years has been sailing as chief officer and master of ships out of St. John and Halifax. He served as master in the Royal Canadian Navy during the war.

ENGAGEMENT ANNOUNCED
The following clipping from a New Orleans newspaper will be of much interest here as Mr. Boyce has a wide circle of relatives and friends who will join in extending their congratulations. Mr. Boyce has been in the land of Dixie for about two years, being in the employ of the Standard Oil Company. First in their extensive oil-fields in Northern Louisiana, and now in their head office in Baton Rouge. Mrs. Willard Roberts announces the engagement of her daughter, Miss Lydia Roberts, to Mr. George Chester Boyce of Prince Edward Island, Canada. The date of the wedding has not yet been decided but it will be some time in the early winter. This announcement is of great interest to the social world here, as Miss Roberts is extremely popular and a decided belle in younger circles of society. Miss Roberts is a graduate of Newcomb college, class of 1920, and a member of the Kappa Kappa Gamma Sorority and favorite among members of the college set.

Berlin Make Fo mal Reparation Proposa
BERLIN, Nov. 7.—Berlin has informally proposed to the Allied Reparations Commission the negotiation of an international loan of 500,000,000 marks. Dr. Hermes, the German finance minister, has taken the initial step to transfer the current preparatory work to the state's representatives from the state of preliminary discussions to a concrete basis of negotiation. Neither party in the present conference so far has shown its hand, the German government having confined the presentation of its cause to a detailed recital of the causes and effects of currency depreciation on the nation's finances, while M. Barthou and his colleagues on the Commission are reported to have conducted themselves as polite listeners to the documentary evidence presented by Dr. Hermes, and his aides are alleged to have intimated that the time was now ripe for receiving from the German officials tangible and precisely formulated proposals.

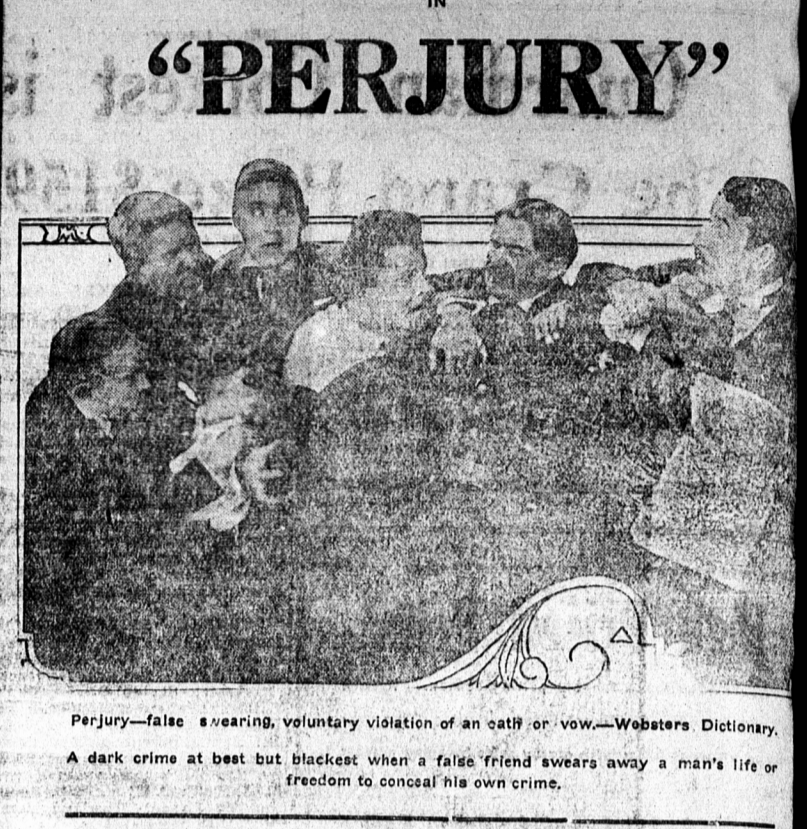
Woman hyllocks Worse Than Men

1, 1922, were 16,000 times as much as in 1914. Inasmuch as inflation proceeds in geometric ratio—that is, prices rise faster than volume of circulating medium—the unheard-of rise of paper ruble prices is technically accounted for. On view taken by the experts, or by most of them, was that the submission of this remarkable official statement by the Soviet leaders was motivated by the final admission that they had utterly failed in their disastrous attempt to apply to Karl Marxian principles of communism. The apparent breakdown, known the world over, was thus made more clearly apparent by the amateurs in economics who sought to revolutionize not only the governments of the earth but also the economic laws to which informed mankind had necessarily subscribed. It was recalled that Lenin, President of the Soviet Republic, in a speech on October 17, 1921, declared to his followers "that his hearers could not but remark the sudden change in the economic policy of the Soviets, which now included elements of the old economic system that had not hitherto been the case."

Passing the Dividend May Settle Crerar
OTTAWA, Nov. 7.—There is a strong impression that the action of Hon. T. A. Crerar's company, the United Grain Growers in passing its dividend for the first time in its history will influence strongly his position in politics and very probably will result in his retirement from the leadership of the Progressives in the House. At the annual meeting of the company last November the opinion was expressed that he should retire from the leadership and devote his entire time to the company, he asked for a year to consider the matter and now the time has come to make a decision. If there was good reason for him resigning at that time the passing of the dividend makes the reason all the stronger, such a proceeding always leads to a demand to strength, economy, etc., and one may be sure that there will be tightening of the screws all round.
