GREEKS CLAIM PART OF TURKEY

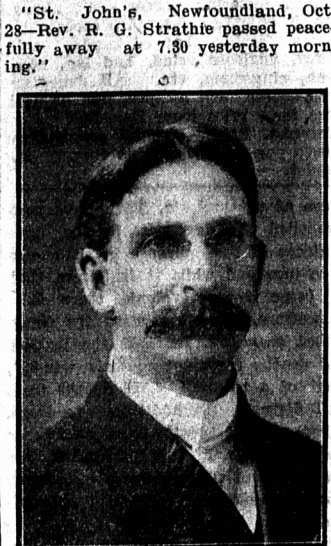
