Canadian Garden Service 1937

The more tender sorts of vegetables are beans, tomato plants, squash, cucumbers, and melons. They will not start to grow until the weather and soil really becomes warm. In order to get a long and steady supply of green beans make at least three plantings at intervals of ten days and use several varieties. To do the same thing with tomatoes, one may use a few well started plants for the first crop and hurry these along with fertilizer and possibly mulch paper. All garden tomatoes should be staked using either wooden or steel stakes about six feet high. Trim off all side shoots as they develop, training the main stem up along the stake and tying loosely about every foot.

Prefer Rich Soil

All these warm weather vegetables prefer rich open soil and any members of the melon family, that is squash, cucumber, citron, etc.,

take special delight in hot sandy soil though it must be made rich with well rotted manure or good garden fertilizer. Along with the vegetables mentioned one may set out egg plants, well started peppers, and the first planting of celery. The latter must have very rich soil and water during dry weather. There is still plenty of time to make second and third sowings of nearly all standard vegetables such as beets, carrots, corn, etc.

Watering

Where possible watering the garden or lawn in dry weather is a wonderful help. In this connection it is important to take the advice from the professional gardeners who rather than sprinkling every day, will soak thoroughly once or twice a week and with the garden, follow this soaking by cultivation just as soon as the

moisture has been fairly well absorbed.

Extra Seed

Most gardeners order considerably more flower seed than is necessary to fill the regular rows. After any "misses" have been filled, garden authorities advise sowing the remainder in rows at the back for cutting, where any type of flower may be planted in the row. The colorful array will be welcome.

Give Them Room

Even the thinnest flower must have ample room to develop into full loveliness and grace and the same is still more true of shrubs and trees. The lawn should not be cramped. No matter how tiny the space at ones disposal, experienced gardeners insist on a little grassy turf in the foreground. This provides a setting for the shrubs. Along the fences and walls, these people plant all the shrubbery wanted, but they strongly advise against spreading it all over the place. Irregular clump planting rather than straight rows or odd beds here and there are urged.

With perennial flowers, too, the average gardener is urged to be hardhearted. Iris, peony, lily-of-the-valley, evening primroses, phlox

Diamond Trade Shows Improvement

JOHANNESBURG, May 27—The largest diamond producing corporation in the world, De Beers Consolidated Mines, Ltd., in Kimberley have just published their annual report for 1936, which reveals the continued improvement of the diamond trade throughout last year.

The demand for diamonds, says the report, continues to expand, and the prospects for 1937 are satisfactory. In the accounts is shown an unappropriated balance of \$1,329,000 as against an unappropriated balance of \$54,800 a year earlier. The company's diamond account amount to \$2,242,803. Added to these figures are: interests and dividends on investments, \$242,850; profit on investments, \$18,700; making a total of \$3,570,500.

Expenditure was \$830,700, leaving a balance of \$2,739,800. There was \$1,200,000 arrear dividend due to holders of preference shares, which was however, more than covered by the unappropriated balance. The directors expect that these arrears and the dividend for the current six months, amounting in

Turkey Speeding Up On Five-Year Plan

Since the overthrow of the old regime in Turkey, the Republic has added 1,681 miles to the railway lines of the country of which 22 miles are narrow gauge, the balance being standard gauge. This brings the total existing mileage up to approximately 4,220 miles of which 174 miles are narrow gauge.

Railway extension is part of the five-year plan of industrial development drawn up in the winter of 1933-34. During the first seven months of last year 16,000 tons of machinery were imported in the carrying out of the five-year plan; the previous year for the same period importations amounted to 9,000 tons, according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways, which gives an idea as to the extent to which the plan is being accelerated.

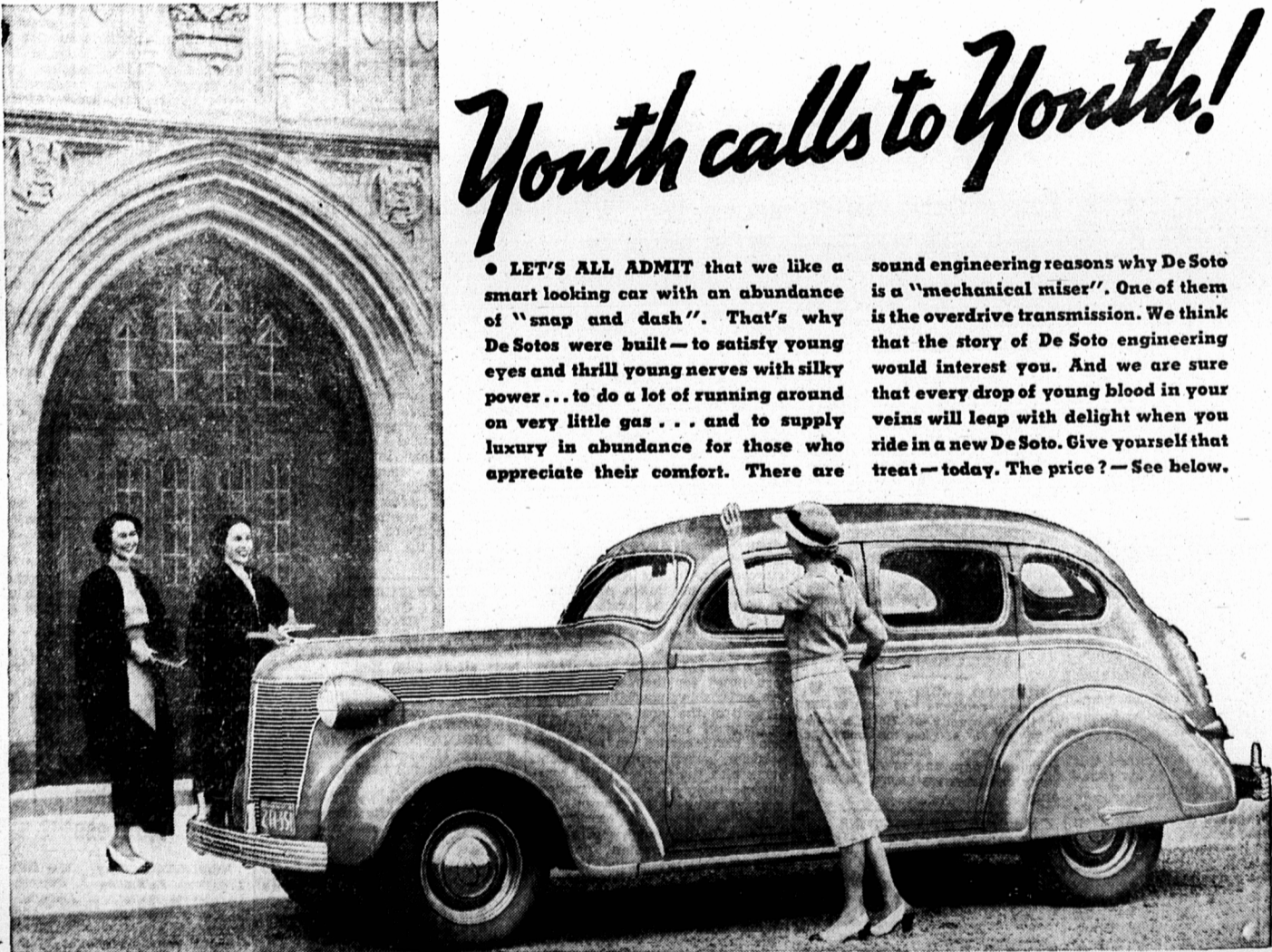
