ST. CROIX BASEBALL CLUB RETAINS TITLE

Brilliant Pitching Duel Between Kallenberg And LeBlanc Features 2-1 Win

YARMOUTH, N. S., Sept. 30.—St. Stephen St. Croix edged out Yarmouth Gateways 2-1 today in a brilliant pitching duel as ever graceful Maritime baseball and took their seventh tri-province amateur baseball championship in eight years in three straight games.

The New Brunswick team took the first two games in St. Stephen, 4-3 and 9-2.

Ken Kallenberg, ace St. Croix right hander, and Copie LeBlanc, slender little Gateways southpaw, gave only six hits between them today. Once again the Yarmouth mound star outpitched his rival, four hits to two, and again he lost. At St. Stephen LeBlanc granted five hits while his team found Kallenberg for nine—and lost 4-3.

Had One Run Lead

Four Gateways errors didn't figure in the scoring but two bases on balls paved the way for both runs. They came after Yarmouth had taken a one-run lead in the seventh on a walk to LeBlanc and Doug Horton's triple to deep centre. The lead looked good enough to win the way both teams were playing.

Low, first St. Croix batter in the eighth, worked LeBlanc for a walk, McLain sacrificed him along and when "Baldy" Moffatt, agile if venerable St. Croix first baseman, grounded out, the Yarmouth fans breathed easier. Low had taken third on the play but two men were down.

Strategy Fails

The Yarmouth board of strategy decided to pass Miles, dangerous St. Croix lead-off man, and pitch to McCarrall, a left-hand batter who failed to hit LeBlanc's shoots with any consistency during the series.

The idea looked good; it looked still better when the little second baseman took the first strike with his bat on his shoulder and then swung viciously at a low wide curve.

Miles went to second on the pitch.

Then, McCarrall got the next pitch midway down his bat and dropped it into right for a hit. Low and Miles both scored easily and McCarrall slid into second on the throw from the outfield. That was all, Ramey Moffatt popping to Halley Horton at short to end the inning, but it was enough.

Kallenberg in Form

Yarmouth could do nothing with Kallenberg. Working easily, bearing down plenty when he had to, he struck out nine Gateways batters, he weathered every threat. A

Newark Bears Again Lose To Red Birds

NEWARK, N. J., Sept. 30.—(AP)—Columbus Red Birds, champions of the American Association, slammed their way into a two-game lead in the little world series tonight by beating Newark Bears, the so-called "wonder team" of the International League, 5-4, in a hectic 11-inning battle.

The score was a duplicate of that in the opener yesterday and, like the first game, tonight's was marked by shabby fielding by both clubs.

The Bears made five errors to help along Columbus' 10 hits while the Red Birds were charged with three miscues.

Three pitchers worked out for each team, the credit for the victory finally going to Bill McGee, 215-pound righthander from Batchtown, Ill., who went in with the bases loaded in the eighth and finished the game.

The International League's leading hurler, young Atley Donald, was the loser, being removed from the game for a pinch hitter in the sixth after giving up six hits and four runs.

Giants First Line Defence Counted Upon To Offset Hitting Powers Of Yanks

(Note: This is the third of a series of stories analyzing the Yankees and Giants, and their world series chances.)

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—Like a sturdy football line standing helplessly while forward passes soar over their heads for long gains, the inner defence of the Giants may hear the discouraging whistle of base-hits headed for the wide open spaces—if you believe all you hear about the bombardment the Yankees intend to turn loose in the world series.

For the time being there is no dispute from this corner about the superior run-making power of the world champions. Passing for the moment a growing notion that the Yankees are a soft touch for first class southpaw pitching, we offer for today's speculation the evidence that the Giants have a pronounced superiority around the infield, collectively speaking.

Lou Gehrig, of course, dominates first base as well as the Yankee attack. The iron man of New Rochelle is still baseball's no. 1 first baseman, steady on the defence and a threat every time he steps to the plate.

Yet such are the vagaries of world series fortune that his rival on the Giants, long John McCarthy, might steal the show. McCarthy's comeback is one of the most startling developments of the Giants' late season surge.

Conceding Gehrig's marked advantage on form, however, the fact remains that the rest of the Giants infield has decided edge, both offensively and defensively.

The Yankees will go into the series with the same combination they used last year, whereas the Giants have two conspicuous replacements, with McCarthy in the spot where Terry hobbled through the 1936 series, on a bad knee.

Harry Urrrie, another right-winger, former Abegweit player who for the past two seasons has been campaigning with the Hershey Bears, champions of the Eastern United States Amateur League will get an opportunity to crash big time hockey this season alongside his softball teammate Kelly with the Detroit Club.

Rated off little more than a month's play Ott comes close to being the best third sacker in the majors. His Yankee rival, Robert (Red) Rolfe has a field edge on paper, but he hasn't Ott's flair on the defence nor the Giant star's power at the plate.

The keystone combination of Dick Bartell and Burgess Whitfield is something for Giant rooters to cheer about. It outshines the Yankee pair, Frankie Crosetti and Tony Lazzari.

Lazzari is one of the smartest infielders in baseball but he is winding up his career in the big show this year, on his own admission. Don Heffner, a slick infielder, is Lazzari's understudy.

Bartell, on this year's record, excels Crosetti in every vital department of play.

If there is need for replacements the Giants have old slogan man, Blondy Ryan, as well as Chiozza, but nothing short of serious mishap will afford either a chance to do infield duty. The Giants have no worries about their first line of defence.

Hubbell Hurls New Yorkers To 2-1 Win Over Phillies To End Great Stretch Drive

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Climaxing their second straight "Frank Merriwell" dash down the stretch, New York Giants clinched the National League pennant today at Philadelphia.

They won their 15th senior circuit championship, their second in a row, and their third in five years under Manager Bill Terry by taking the opening game of a doubleheader from the Phillies 2-1. They dropped the nightcap 6-2.

To Carl Hubbell went the honor of putting the old convincer on the drive by which they came from third place in July, and from seven games behind in early August, to retain the honors they won last year with a similar drive.

The Giants, featuring the work of two classy left-handers in Hubbell and Cliff Melton, a rookie who has won 20 games and lost nine so far this season, and exploding a newly-found batting barrage at a .320 hitting pace down the last month of the season, fully earned the league bunting.

PIRATES FINISH THIRD

The battle between Pittsburgh Pirates and St. Louis Cardinals for third place in the league apparently was settled in the Bucs' favor on one inning.

Pittsburgh, at home, belted Lefty Bob Weiland from the box with five hits and four runs in the first chapter for a 4-3 victory which placed the Pirates 2-1-2 games ahead of the Cardinals.

Led by Frank Demaree, Chicago Cubs broke a one-all tie in the ninth inning to win 4-1 and make it four straight over Cincinnati Reds before a crowd which, when play started, included an even dozen bleacherites. By the time the turnstiles stopped clicking, however, 630 fans were in the Cincinnati stands.

Brooklyn Dodgers' losing streak, longest in the major leagues this season, was stretched to 14 straight as the daffy Dodgers dropped both ends of a doubleheader to the Bees, 5-2 and 3-2.

TIGERS IN SECOND PLACE
NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Detroit Tigers clinched second place in the American League today even though they were overwhelmed by St. Louis Browns 10-3.

Assurance of runner-up position to the Yankees came when the third place Chicago White Sox lost a doubleheader to Cleveland Indians.

Cleveland climbed to within 1 1/2 games of third-place Chicago White Sox as Johnny Allen whipped the Hose 6-4 in the opener of a double bill for his 15th straight win of the season and Bob Feller fanned 11 to down the Chicagoans 4-1 in an eight inning nightcap, called on account of darkness.

Boston Red Sox and Washington Senators divided a doubleheader to close the major league season in the capital. Washington won the first game 4-3 but dropped the second 9-3. Wes Ferrell and Jack Wilson were the winning pitchers.

Yankees dropped their first doubleheader of the season and their first series on their home lot when the Athletics swept a bargain bill 8-3 and 6-3 from the world champions.

Unable to do anything consistent clouting against Harry Kelly in the opener, they were beaten with nine hits. In the nightcap, young Buck Ross baffled them with five hits before darkness halted the game at the end of the seventh.
