programme here something with regard to the amendments of the Prohibition Act. I trust that it will include an amendment to that particular section. I would like my hon. friend the Attorney General to tell us how much, so far, has it cost the Government to defend that section in the court. I know that it took a good deal of time of one of his representatives of an attorney who was acting for the Attorney General, to defend it; for the Attorney General, to defend it; and we are no further ahead than we were before the trial. The decision of the Court was given on a preliminary matter that did not affect the merits of the case; so we are right where we started a year ago, and the authority and the jurisdiction of that Magistrate is still just as much in question as it ever was. The decision was simply on this ground, that the method of attack—certiorari—was not the right course to take. So that we do not know how much it will yet cost to determine whether this Magistrate has the authority which this Act is supposed to give him, and whether the section in question is not ultra vires of this Legislature.

Those other provisions in the amendments of 1928 which were deemed so necessary, so vital—so far as I have been able to ascertain—have not been put into effect at all during the past year.

UNFAIR COMPARISON

I do not think there is very much more that I need say. I have nothing to say with regard to this programme. Our friends of the Patriot newspaper considered it really wonderful, and they made the rather unfair comparison with the legislation passed during the last year the late Government was in power. This Government has not yet reached its last session, perhaps though it may not be very far away. Let us see what they will have for their last year's programme. What will the valedictory programme be? I would suggest to the Patriot that they might compare the last year's legislative programme of the late Government with that of the Bell Government; that might be a fair comparison. We all know that it is not the custom of any Government during the last session, federal or provincial, to embark on any ambitious programme of legislation.

I have no fault to find with this programme, so far as it goes. It is an ordinary one. Some of the suggestions are very well, if the acts are properly drawn up. I will be only too glad to give my support and any assistance I can to any of them that are in the public interest. But there is not anything to boast about.

With regard to the public accounts, there is nothing to be said. This is not the proper time to debate that matter; but I have no doubt that with the public services, many of which I have mentioned, practically not dealt with at all, the expenditure should be comparatively light for the past year. They have had a large increase in revenue, as we all know; my hon. friend the Premier admitted last year that it would be at least over \$30,000. We should have a good showing, and I hope, for the sake of the credit of the Province, that the public accounts will disclose a good, healthy condition of the finances.

CREDIT (IF ANY) WHERE DUE

I do not like to select one individual in a debate of this kind, but I am going to say now that if there is a good showing I am going to give the credit to the Provincial Treasurer. I hope, when the time comes, that he will deliver the Budget. He should. I believe my hon. friend has been staying at home at-

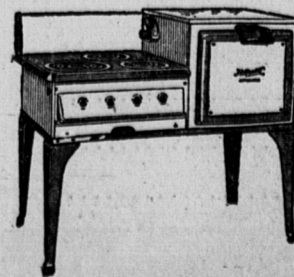
of Port Credit, were picking up their nets on Saturday morning, a few miles off Marigold Point at Clarkson. It stood by Bray's boat until he had completed his work and then
