### RELIGIOUS SERVICES

**THE SALVATION ARMY**  
Major Keith of St. John was the speaker at both services Sunday and gave forceful sermons, taking as his subject in the morning: "Bearing the Cross", Math. 16th chap. verse 24.

All are agreed that there never has been a time in the world's history when Christ was more needed.  
Needed in our hospitals, our jails, our public life, in our city streets where so much that is wrong is going on.

**ST. JAMES CHURCH**  
At the morning service of St. James Presbyterian Church yesterday, Rev. Dr. R. Foothead Legate preached an impressive sermon on the theme "What is Wrong with the World?". He took as the text of his subject Leviticus 19:1. The text of his sermon appears elsewhere.  
Dr. Legate at the evening worship spoke from the First Epistle of John 4:4 "Greater is he that is in you than he that is in the world." The Minister pointed out that the text was taken from a letter which John had written to a group of Christian friends encouraging them in living the Christian life and urging them not to be disheartened by the amount of evil prevalent and which surrounded them. Dr. Legate declared Christians today faced much the same task, but so long as they sincerely embraced the teachings of Christ and gave themselves wholeheartedly to his cause the goodness in them would conquer badness and evil influences of the world.  
At the morning service the choir rendered the anthem "God is a Spirit," and in the evening the anthem "Sweet is Thy Mercy," with Mrs. H. S. Henderson taking the solo part.

### TRINITY UNITED CHURCH

The Holy Communion of the Lord's Supper was observed at the morning worship by a large congregation. The sermon dealt with the reconsecration of life based on God's command to Jacob, "Arise, go up to Bethel." As Jacob was called to reconsecrate himself, so are we especially at the Lord's Table so closely associated with His redemptive sacrifice. Guided by His Spirit we come in contrition, humility, confession and faith to renew our consecration.  
At the evening service the Chaminade Chorus under the direction of Mrs. Hugh Miller led the congregation in a service of praise.

### YOUNG PEOPLE'S SONG SERVICE

A large gathering of young people attended the Sunday evening after-church service held last night in St. Peter's Cathedral. Rev. Canon Malone was in charge of the service and delivered a very interesting address which was a digest of the Oxford conference report, "Churches Survey Their Task". Canon Malone dealt specifically with a subsection of the report, discussing the Church Universal and the World of Nations. The address indicated the condition of the world, disrupted by national divisions and the state of bewilderment and tension which has developed since the years of the World War.  
It was pointed out to its young people that this is God's world and that Christ is the world's only hope to a solution of its difficulties. The machinery existing for international goodwill was briefly outlined and various mediums of the church's witness were indicated. The service next Sunday evening will be held in the Baptist Church.

### SILVER FOX PELT SHOW IS MOOTED

It is almost a certainty that a Silver Fox Pelt Show will be held in Charlottetown. At a meeting of the Charlottetown Fox Club Thursday evening the matter was discussed and interesting information given to the members present by Col. U. G. Dawson of the Charlottetown Fur Sales Co. There was unanimity of opinion regarding the advisability of the show, and a committee of five was appointed to confer with the Department of Agriculture under whose sponsorship fox demonstrations and other active help for the fox industry has been given.  
While a definite program has not been settled the general idea is to have the show take place on Tuesday and Wednesday, Dec. 28 and 29. Five classes similar to classifications adopted by the fur sales organizations would be used as a basis for competition, namely dark silvers or one-eighths; dark mediums or one-quarters mediums or one-halves; three-quarter and pales. There is a possibility that the three-quarters might be divided into two classifications. Whether or not there will be separate classes for pups has not been determined.  
A small entrance fee will be charged. Cups and trophies will be provided for the winners as well as ribbons.  
The securing of a suitable place to hold the show is what is giving the committee the greatest concern. The actual judging of pelts will not present any difficulties as Col. Dawson on behalf of the Charlottetown Fur Sales Co. has offered their splendid grading rooms for this purpose, where the pups would have excellent light and good facilities. The pelts could then be transferred to the display centre where suitable racks could be set up and facilities used for their proper exhibition.
