Fur dealer is Puzzle to court PICTOU, N. S. Aug. 1—(CP)—Julius Schwartz, Yarmouth, N. S., fur buyer, whose sentence for dealing in fur pelts without a licence is puzzling Nova Scotia's Supreme Court, escaped yesterday from custody in hospital here. He was taking treatment for blood poisoning. The Supreme Court now is considering his appeal against conviction on 984 charges laid under the Nova Scotia lands and forests act. Magistrate W. A. Richardson of Stellarton, N.S., sentenced Schwartz to 25 or 25 days on each charge, but did not specify if the terms were to run concurrently or consecutively. If the court decides the terms should run consecutively, Schwartz would serve 67 years or pay a fine of nearly \$25,000. He remained at liberty tonight. Left alone at lunch time, he walked out of the hospital into a drenching rain and was last seen, lightly clad on a New Glasgow street.
