

# R.C.A.F. Down Holman's 6-5 At S'side Last Night

A wild leave by Perry with two out in the last half of the seventh ended a closely fought battle between the R.C.A.F. Bayne and Drouin struck out, but Mickus's single to left sent Pellissier home, tying the score.

## Blistering Battle For National League Lead Continues Unabated

Boston Braves last night shook off, at least temporarily, their persistent rivals for the National League leadership and stepped one full game out front of the pack with an 8-6, uphill victory over Pittsburgh Pirates.

For a few hours before the evening encounter, Boston, New York Giants and Brooklyn Dodgers had been tied for first place. The Giants whipped Chicago Cubs 11-5 in an afternoon tussle while Brooklyn was losing 3-2 to St. Louis Cardinals. Before yesterday's game, Boston and Brooklyn had been tied on top with New York one game behind.

In the other night game played, Philadelphia Phillies pushed across two 10th-inning runs to down Cincinnati Reds 4-3. The score was tied three times in the game but Eddie Waitkus' single sent Ritchie Ashburn across with the 10th-inning tying run and Semmler's fly scored Gran Hamner with the winner for Philadelphia.

But the key game in the tussling leadership race was Boston's hard-earned win over the Pirates. Both teams used up pitchers at a great rate and Pittsburgh had all the early advantage. The Pirates scored one run in the first and four in the second but Boston jumped on starters Bob Marich and pitcher Bill Mauer. Semmler's fly scored Gran Hamner with the winner for Philadelphia.

Local sport enthusiasts, who have been having a quiet interlude during the past several weeks since the hockey and basketball seasons came to an end and have been spending ever since for some conditions "sporting" action, will get more than they bargained for this week-end and first of next week when both the Islanders and Junior Baseball Leagues launch into full swing in their regular scheduled play.

On Sunday the newly organized Island Baseball League will start the ball rolling with a double bill at the Memorial Field diamond when all three entries in the League will start their season. The Charlottetown Abegweit squad will have the lion's share of the competitions when they tangle with the Summerside R.C.A.F. nine in the first tilt and the Summerside Curran and Briggs segregation in the second.

Following close on their heels, the Knights of Columbus and Charlottetown Kinsmen squads will test their strength against one another in the opening round of the City Junior Baseball League and as well as the Abegweit, announced last night that they will hold a stiff practice session at Memorial Field tonight in preparation for the forthcoming tussles.

"Some of the P.G.A. executives regard him as a menace so they barred him out of the American open, deciding that he isn't exactly a visitor. This despite the fact that he is in America on a visitor's passport.

"As a visitor he has to be invited to take part in the tourney. He wasn't invited. Two years ago he won \$65,000 to the great consternation of American pros. They started stories about his parsimony, they called him boohish, spread tales that he was too keen on money making.

"Some golf writers were astounded when they wanted him to reveal some of the secrets of his success. He suggested their papers should pay for the information. That started something. Locke was out to make hay while the sun shone. The American pros, most of whom never show any disdain for money, were plainly miffed at his fondness for what they wanted and couldn't get while he was around.

"The executives, no doubt, provoked by the prominent pro who has a powerful influence, declared that as Locke makes a six-month stand each year he was no longer a visitor, therefore they couldn't invite him under that category."

Eddie Yost and Sam Dent hit home runs to help the Nationals lead 4-1 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals.

## Freddie Mills Slight Favorite In Bout Tonight

LONDON, June 1 — (Reuters) — The stage is set for tomorrow's British heavyweight championship fight between Bruce Woodcock, incumbent, and Freddie Mills, World's British light-heavyweight champion.

The only doubt now concerns the weather — and the result.

London promoter Jack Solomon has had good luck with open air fights in Britain, but he and 46,000 ticket holders were casting anxious eyes skywards as rain has been falling steadily throughout today.

Yet, or fine the size of the crowd is unlikely to be affected as all tickets have been sold and much of the accommodation at White City Stadium here particularly the sheep seats, are under cover.

Lee Beavord, who meets the winner in the British version of the world heavyweight championship in the same arena Sept. 6, said he thought tomorrow's fight would "carry more weight for the world's championship, both in America and elsewhere, than the version of the world title between Ezzard Charles and Jersey Joe Walcott which is only recognized by the American National Boxing Association."

Mills, who has been installed a slight favorite, may have to concede 14 pounds to Woodcock who should scale under 196 pounds. Woodcock's left beat Mills once.

It can do so again but only if the heavyweight champion is psychologically fit. He has fought only 12 rounds of competitive boxing since he returned to the ring after an 18-month absence following his crushing defeat by Joe Baiski in April, 1947.

## National Hockey League Completes Annual Meeting

MONTREAL, June 1 — (CP) — The National Hockey League wound up its annual meeting in brisk fashion today, losing little time in deciding each team henceforth may use an additional player and changing the rule regarding major penalties to goalkeepers.

The clubs' representatives forming the board of governors were reappointed and Clarence Campbell was re-elected president for his fourth term.

Campbell said last season's operations provided "the greatest receipts in history."

Yesterday's decision of the six club owners, after an all-day session, to increase the schedule from 60 to 70 games possibly had a bearing on use of an extra player. Each club now can dress 17 men, excluding the penalty team which will play short-handed. Previously a penalty shot was allowed the opposing team when a goal was given a major.

This change, recommended by the rules committee, will be officially confirmed at the league's September meeting.

It was also agreed that all playing surfaces must be pure white. In some arenas playing surface foundations have given the ice a dark appearance.

The meeting took no action on a suggestion by Art Ross, vice-president and general manager of Boston Bruins, that orange-colored pucks be introduced to permit better visibility of the puck in the air.

A change from the black puck was considered too experimental for immediate consideration.

No action was taken on a suggestion of Jack Adams, general manager of Detroit Red Wings, that the present blue lines marking off defending zones be changed from red to blue.

Adams' idea was that since most offenses occur at the blue lines, a change to red contrasting with the black puck, would permit sharper calling of offides by officials.

## Ray Robinson, Gavilan Sign For Title Bout

PHILADELPHIA, June 1 — (AP) — Welterweight champion Ray (Sugar) Robinson and Kid Gavilan of Havana today signed for a 16-round title bout in Philadelphia Municipal Stadium July 12.

Robinson and Gavilan met last summer in a 10-round non-title fight at New York. The champion won a close decision.

Since then Gavilan has beaten lightweight champion Ike Williams twice in overweight bouts.

Robinson made his last title defense against Bernard Doucens in Chicago last summer, winning a 16-round decision.

Robinson will receive 40 per cent of the net gate receipts, including television and radio, for the fight here. Gavilan will take 15-1-2 per cent.

Municipal Stadium is one of the largest sports fields in the United States. It has been the site of many big fights, including the 1926 Tunney-Dempsey heavyweight title bout.

## Maritime Baseball

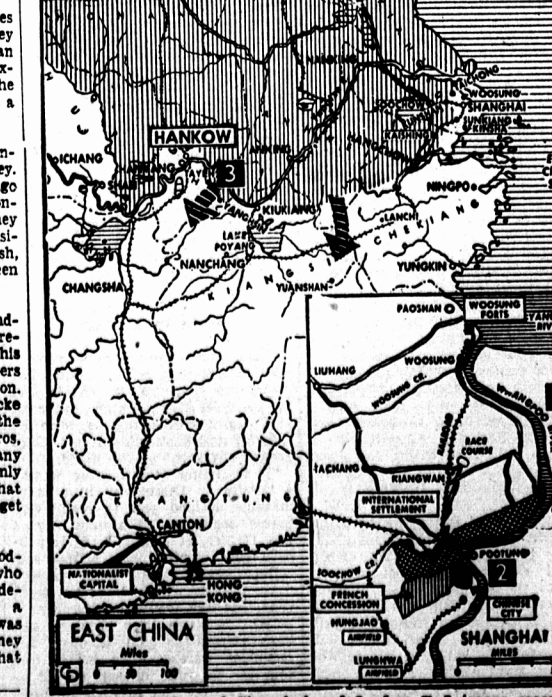

## Pyle Signed For Three Fights In London

GLACE BAY, N.S., June 1 — (CP) — Joltin' Joe Pyle, the hot-and-cold New Waterford, N.S., welterweight who scored a 10-round upset decision over Pat Zaduk of Guelph, Ont., here Monday night, has been signed for three fights in London.

Stan Clements of Montreal, Pyle's new manager, said today Pyle earned the overseas trip by whipping Zaduk, top contender for George Ross' Canadian middleweight title. He gave no further details.

Clements said Pyle was gunning for a return bout with Ross who knocked out his former sparring partner in three rounds in a title bout at Halifax four months ago. Ross had trouble in earning a draw and a 12-round decision over Zaduk, who appeared listless against the sharper Pyle. The proposed Ross-Pyle fight would be staged after the English tour, Clements said.

## 100 Hockey Big-Wigs Gather For N.Y. Meeting

NEW YORK, June 1 — (CP) — Probably the biggest roundup in history of hockey officials, managers, managers, former big-leaguers and coaches gathered tonight for a convention that will keep them here until next Monday.

The convention, officially the 32nd annual meeting of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association and the 12th annual session of the Amateur Hockey Association of the United States, has drawn more than 100 big-and-small-time followers of the game. It is the first time the C.A.H.A. has met outside Canada.

They are all here, or expected to arrive. The four professional leagues — National American Pacific and United States — will have a big representation.

The convention starts with a Thursday morning meeting of the C.A.H.A. resolutions committee and until Sunday morning afternoon and evening sessions are on the agenda.

Apart from the private sessions, two things appear to be on the cards. They are:

1. A general review of Sudbury Wolves' jaunt to Europe last winter for the "world" amateur championships at Stockholm, won by Czechoslovakia. Coach Max Silverman of Sudbury is listed as a delegate and he probably will give details of the trip to the C.A.H.A. sponsors of the team.

2. The C.A.H.A. and N.H.A. might have their answer to Ontario educational authorities' charges that organized hockey is luring students from their studies. The ball-rolling started in Ottawa last January when Dr. J.L. Murray of Kingston, Ont., Collegiate Institute, told a meeting of sports governing bodies in the Dominion that this was an "evil which has grown without the governing bodies realizing the result." He called for "drastic and immediate action."
