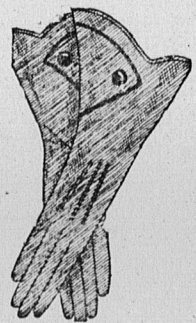

ENTERS SUMMONS AGAINST HIS WIFE

MONTREAL, Sept. 13.—Adrien Vanier, 59-year-old shoe store manager, reported to have won \$54,000 on a sweepstake ticket in the St. Leger classic, today stepped into court and drew out a summons against his wife on a charge of participating in a lottery. Mrs. Vanier is scheduled to appear in court next week.

The winning ticket was held in Vanier's name, but it is presumed, on the basis of his action today, that it has been transferred to his wife. As informant he will be entitled to retain earnings of the ticket.

DISCOVERER OF LIQUID CRYSTALS

STOCKHOLM, Sept. 13.—(C.P.)—C. W. Oseen, well-known Swedish scientist and professor in Physics at the University of Upsala, was recently appointed head of the Institute of Physics of the Nobel Foundation at Frescati near Stockholm. The post was formerly held by the famous scientist, Svante Arrhenius. The principal and most trying task entrusted to Professor Oseen will be to test and weigh the qualifications of the candidates for the Nobel prize in physics. He will also continue his own special scientific research work on the so-called liquid crystals, a comparatively unknown subject. The Professor states he has discovered no less than 2,000 different organic substances in the form of liquid crystals, especially in the human body. He will publish his results in a large scientific treatise.

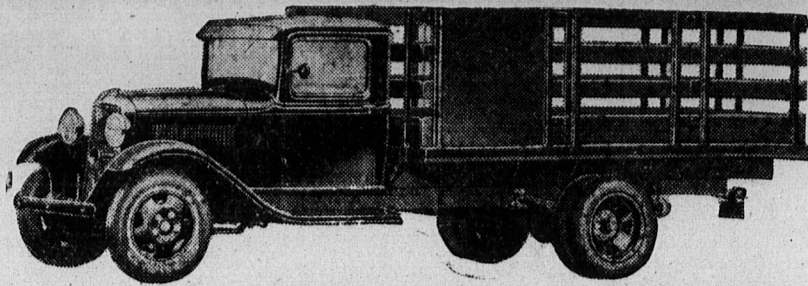

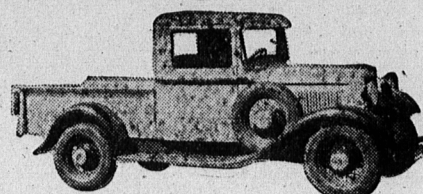

WIFE FINED FOR DRIVING CAR
