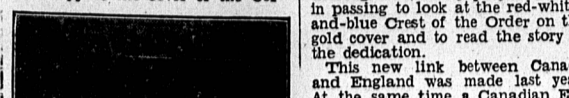

A New Canadian Link In The Mother Land

A Canadian who has just lately returned from a visit to England says that one day recently, while standing near the Guildhall in London, he saw a small crowd of people gazing at something hanging on the wall of St. Lawrence Jewry Church nearby. Curious to see what the attraction was, he joined them, and found to his surprise and delight that they were gazing at a copy of the cover of the Cor-

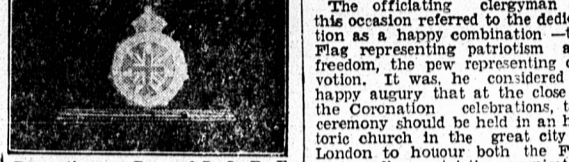

(The official magazine of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire in Canada) which, together with an illustrated page from the magazine describing the dedication of a pew to the Daughters of the Empire in St. Lawrence Jewry, had been framed and fastened to the wall of the church. He said that while he stood on this busy thoroughfare, many people paused in passing to look at the red-white-and-blue Crest of the Order on the gold cover and to read the story of the dedication.

This new link between Canada and England was made last year. At the same time a Canadian Ensign, which hangs near the pew and which was presented to the Church by the City of Vancouver, B. C., was unveiled by the Hon. Vincent Massey. At the close of this ceremony his Grace Archbishop DeFenwick of New Westminster, B. C., dedicated the Flag and the pew.

The entire expense of furnishing the pew and of having the Canadian Coat of Arms painted on the pew-end was borne by a member of St. Lawrence Jewry Church who is greatly interested in Canada and in the work of the I. O. D. E.

The officiating clergyman on this occasion referred to the dedication as a happy combination—the Flag representing patriotism and devotion, it was, he considered, a happy augury that at the close of the Coronation celebrations, this historic church in the great city of London to honour both the Flag and a fine patriotic organization of a vigorous Dominion like Canada.

Soviets Lose To Alberton Regals 5-3

The Summerside Soviets were defeated Saturday night, at the crystal rink 5-3 by the last skating Alberton Regals in a regular league fixture. The Soviets took a first period lead only, as they overhauled in the second and widely outscored in the third. Alberton turned in a brilliant win as they played consistent hockey all the way. Referees Lefursey and Gallant kept a close check on the teams as they handed out ten penalties. The game was attended by a large crowd of Alberton fans who made the trip with their team.

OPENS FAST

The first period opened fast with both teams throwing on the power. Alberton held a slight edge in the opening minutes of the period, but were caught up the ice at 7:45 when Alan Clow scooped in G. Arsenault's rebound. The Soviets then opened an attack that for the most part of the period remaining had Canadian Coach in front. The Regals' defence played sensationally to rob sure goals as Summerside broke through. Both defenses were bumping heavily as the period ended.

REGALS TAKE LEAD

The Regals took the offensive with the opening whistle of the second canto and at 2:08 E. Millman got his stick on A. Malley's pass to beat Referee in front. Alberton kept ganging the Soviet territory. J. Malley put the West-erners out front as he grabbed a loose pass to sink it into the net. Both teams started to rough it a bit and Referees Lefursey and Gallant started dishing out the penalties. At 11:27 W. Arsenault scored on a hard drive to tie it up. E. Millman and Clow drew major penalties for staging an unsanctioned wrestling match on the ice. Shortly after K. Profit took a penalty the Soviets pressed hard but the Regals put up a hard skating defense to hold off the Soviets as the bell ended the second frame.

EXTEND LEAD

The Regals went to town in the third period as they outscored the Soviets three to one to win the hard fought struggle. M. Matthews rattled in the first at 1:17. Less than two minutes later E. Millman blazed A. Malley's pass into the Soviet twines to make it 4-2 for the white and green. At 5:50 after a wild scramble the puck tricked into the Alberton Cage. W. Perry was credited with the marker. The Regals still forced the play. Art Malley raced down the ice on a solo rush to race a bullet like shot from the blue lines that was too hot for Ferguson to handle. The Soviets tried a desperate offensive but their effectiveness was crippled by penalties as they tried every means to score. The Regals held an air tight

speeches does not apply to the prime minister nor to the leader of the opposition in this debate and their arguments in previous debates on the address have been known to run three and four hours in length, sometimes longer.

Expect Estimates Early

Presentation of the main estimates for the next fiscal year will probably come early in the session, possibly this week. Last year they came down on the first Monday after the opening and in 1936 they came in on the first Tuesday. Finance Minister Dunning is expected to present in the main estimates a spending program not

much heavier than last year, although there have been some rumors that defence costs would be increased. Later in the session supplementary estimates will be brought in to add to the total. Cabinet Council scheduled for Saturday morning was cancelled but there will probably be meetings every day at noon this week and every week during the session. At the opening Thursday new members were introduced and at Friday's brief session tributes were paid to those members who died during the long recess. Tomorrow's meeting will be the real start of the session. There are already eight Government and private bills ready for introduction and 52 questions and notices of motion on the order paper.

St. Lawrence Jewry Church in London

This ancient church was named for St. Lawrence the Martyr and for the district surrounding it, which when the church was built in 1220, was mainly inhabited by Jews. Its name St. Lawrence in the Jewry, or St. Lawrence Jewry, still obtains. As it is the Lord Mayor's Church, one of the oldest services known in England takes place in it before the civic election. The Lord Mayor and Corporation come in procession to the church from the Guildhall, each carrying posies of flowers emblematic of the herbs which were distributed in 1664-5, in an effort to allay the scourge of the Great Plague. This ceremony was begun by Dick Whittington three hundred years ago. In this beautiful old church—rebuilt by Christopher Wren in 1666—Charles II came to worship as did also Pepys and other notable. Through the centuries it has been the burying place of many eminent persons, among them an ancestor of the first Queen, Elizabeth, Sir Godfrey Bullen (Boleyn) who was Lord Mayor of London in 1459.

And to-day Canada is represented in this historic and hallowed church. A Canadian Ensign hangs there and a pew (on the door of which the Canadian Coat of Arms are emblazoned) has been dedicated to the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire. Here will be welcomed the Order's young War Memorial students in London, visiting members of the Order, and other Canadian overseas, who may come to worship and rest awhile.

NEW YORK, Jan. 30.—(AP)—Bill Terry made what appeared to be a move toward burying the hatchet in his row with the baseball writers Saturday, and then predicted his National League pennant for the third straight year. In his first meeting with New York writers since his recent magazine article blasting them, "sweet William" made no mention of the fuss. He was more pleasant than at any previous time in the memory of the oldest inhabitant. In his 42nd street office, he reviewed the coming season from the Terry standpoint, picked the Cubs to give the Giants their toughest fight with St. Louis Cardinals as a strong threat, looked forward to another "nickel" world series with the Yankees, and then reveled in his home trading lions' in the fire, possibly involving ivory deals with Cincinnati Reds or the Cubs.
