Deceased was born in Ernschffe Lot 50 in 1837. After attending the local school in Wesley, Canada, he worked at shoe-making with his brother Edward until the age of twenty two. He then entered the Normal School attaining a teachers license the following year. For some years following his graduation from Normal School he followed the profession of teaching in his native school in Wesley, Canada. In 1873 he married Minna Fairclough of China Point who predeceased him 22 years. Shortly after this he gave up teaching on account of failing health and moved to Tignish where he remained until his death. Besides two brothers and two sisters he leaves to mourn six sons viz — Patrick and Joseph in Wesley, Canada, John in New Jersey, Walter in New York, Arthur in Halifax and Joseph at home also five daughters Mrs. A. J. Steves and Mrs. W. F. Hallman of Boston, Mrs. P. J. Cahill and Mrs. A. L. Kinch of Alberton and Mary E. at home. He has left behind him the memory of a long and useful life of which the good deeds in themselves are a monument which needs no further tribute from those whom he has left. MR. O. B. WADMAN

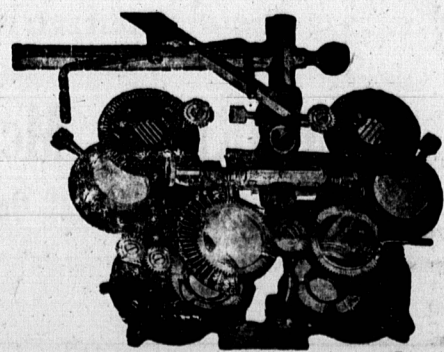
